Mason succeeds Byron Pitts in the position of public relations director. Pitts resigned to take a position as news reporter and weekend anchorman with WNCT-TV in Greenville.

Luther King Jr. holiday, which since has been signed into law, Gray added, "I get upset when I see U.S. senators get up on the floor and act a fool, like it was 20 years ago."

Gray also said he fears President Reagan's attempts to military power as a cure-all.

"We haven't learned that this world is too small a place for us to try to solve problems with military power," he said.

As for whether black people should concern themselves with foreign affairs, Gray quipped, "Nuclear war is an equal opportunity destroyer."

In closing, Gray challenged his audience, which included a number of candidates for state office, to vote, to form coalitions and to learn how to place internal differences in their proper perspective.

"We can differ on which road to take," he said, "but never on where we're going."

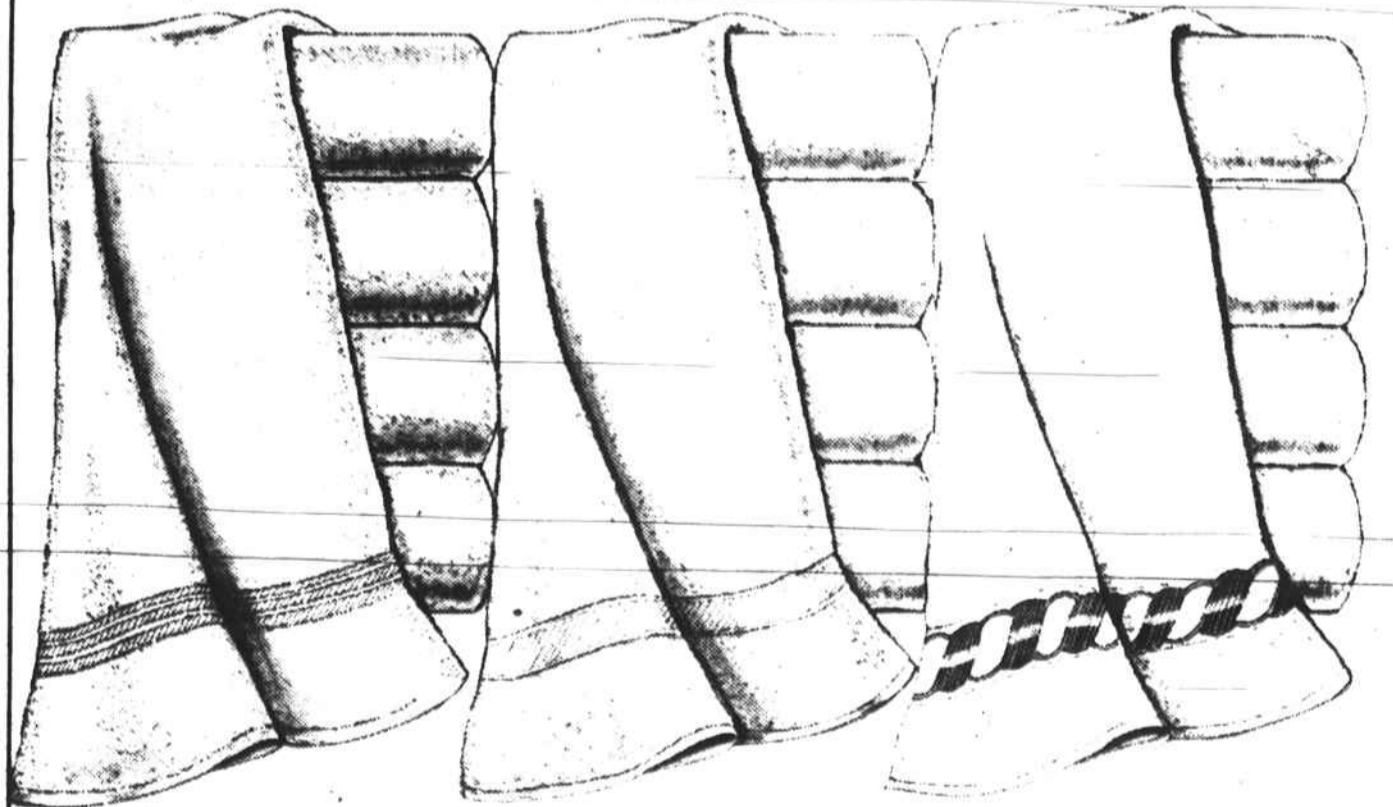
