Woodward is a virtuoso recitalist, chamber musician and soloist with orchestra. She has performed in many cultural centers of Europe and North America including Carnegie Recital Hall in New York and Wigmore Hall in London where her playing received critical acclaim.

The artist is professor of music and chairman of string instruction at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She is a graduate of the Curtis Institute of Music where she studied with Max Aronoff, and was a first recipient of the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the Yale School of Music where she was a student of David Schwartz. She has also been awarded grants for study in France with

Nadia Boulanger, in Italy with Bruno Giuranna, and in England with Kato Havas.

Barbara Rowan is an active performer of both chamber music and the solo repertoire for piano. Although North Carolina has been her musical home since 1964, she has played widely on the East Coast from Florida to Boston as well as California where she received her education at Mills College under Egon Petri, Darius Milhaud, Leon Kirchner and Alexander Liebermann. She has been a Fulbright Scholar in Paris and has performed with the San Francisco, Oakland, and North Carolina symphonies. She is a lecturer in music at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.
