Watts, from WSSU's art department, to exhibit

An exhibit of woodblock prints by Roland Watts will be displayed at the Delta Arts Center on 1511 F. Third St. from June 17-July 20. A reception for the artist was held on Sunday, June 17, from 4-6 p.m. at the center.

Watts was born in Philadelphia. He received his bachelor's degree in vocational and industrial education from North Carolina A&T State University in 1957 and his master's of science degree in in-

dustrial arts education in 1959 from A&T. He did further study at A&T and in 1969 he received a master of fine arts degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

Watts' prints are reflective of his creative ability. His prints, which are done in a unique way, reveal the true beauty and strength of wood through his specializing in the medium of woodcrafting. He has developed into one of the most well-known, productive

woodblock printers in the Southeast.

Since 1969, Watts has exhibited his work in over 13 one-man shows and has participated in nearly 40 juried and invitational group shows in the state and beyond. In 1976 he was chosen the featured artist for the quarterly publication of Lowe's Companies Inc. The publication highlighted five of his woodblock prints. In the spring of 1977, the North Carolina Society for Original Graphics commissioned Watts to do a limited edition of prints for their Collector's Choice Series.

A prolific artist, Watts' work is included in the collection of North Carolina National Bank, A&T, the Reynolda House in Winston-Salem and many private collections throughout the United States and Canada. Watts has co-authored a book on woodblock prints and the poetry entitled, "Once in Every Generation," published by Impress Graphics Inc. of Oklahoma.

He presently serves as chairman of the art department and professor of art at Winston-Salem State University. He has been affiliated with the North Carolina Art Association, the Associated Artists of North Carolina and the National Art Education Association. Watt has also served on the board of directors of the Gallery of Contemporary Art and the Arts and Crafts Association.

The Watts exhibit is free and the public is invited. Exhibition hours are Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2-6 p.m., and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. For more information, call 722-2625. 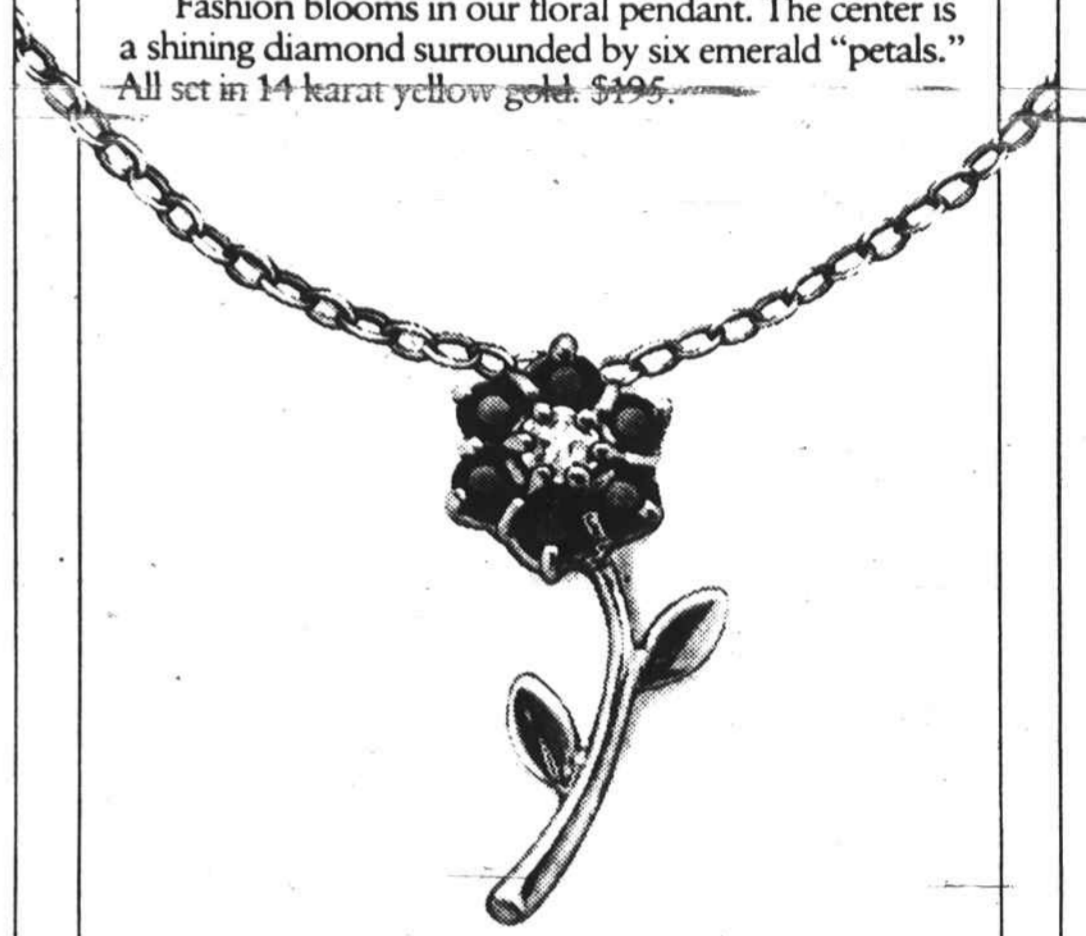
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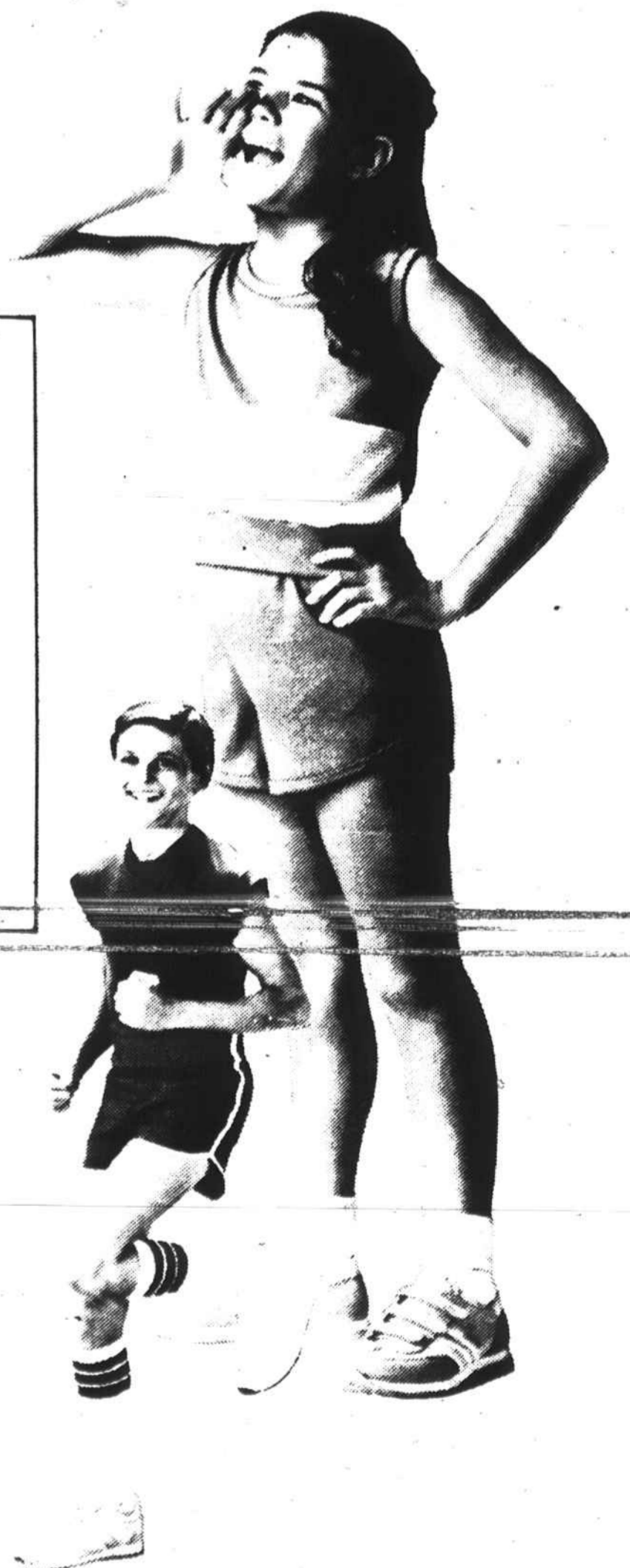
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
