Focus On Religion

He's glad to be back home

If there's a church social to be had at the Waughtown Baptist Church on Moravia Street, rest assured that the pastor, the Rev. Dennis Bishop, will be there, even if it means donning an apron to fry fish or playing third base in a softball game.

Bishop, 29, who says he's been challenged to show his driver's license to prove his age, became pastor of Waughtown Baptist just over a year ago, replacing the retiring Rev. E.L. Grant:

Gradually, the church began to attract more and more young members, and institute new programs. A native of Winston-Salem, Bishop says he began

his ministry at the age of 13, while a member of the Ambassadors for Christ Cathedral. In 1975, he joined Grant at Waughtown as his

assistant pastor. Five years later, he was appointed the pastor of New Bethel Baptist Church in Mocksville, where he remained for three years. Now he has returned, with a bang, to Winston.

"It's good to be back home," he says, with a grin of satisfaction. "If you leave home right, you can always come back."

Bishop, who is known for his fiery sermons, is in big demand throughout the Piedmont and southside Virginia. Until he and his wife Sharon married two years ago, he says, he headlined 16 to 20 revivals a year. Now he heads seven or eight yearly.

But it's his genuine concern and his delivery of the Gospel, he says, that have helped Waughtown Baptist increase its membership by 200 since he came last May. Forty percent of that number,

Bishop proudly adds, are men.

The church now boasts a roster of 300 to 325

"It makes me feel real good to know that The Word is accomplishing," says Bishop. "But I also feel that I have a good relationship with my people."

That relationship is a cooperative effort involving both Bishop and his wife, who directs the young adult choir, he says.

Bishop, who works also as a truck driver and

he nevertheless feels it's necessary to be more than just a Sunday preacher. His role, he says, is to become acquainted with all the members of the church.

"For the boys of the church who may not have a father figure, I take them to wrestling matches or baseball games," Bishop says. "I didn't have a father figure but I think my mother did a good job. I want them to know what's it's like to have a father figure."

Bishop also enjoys spending time with the church's elderly members.

"There is no gap," he says. "Sometimes I jump on the van with my elderly people after church and

have ice cream or a milkshake with them -- on me.

"I have to have a one-on-one relationship with our members," says Bishop. "I write one of our members who's in prison. I talk with them. I laugh with them."

And if members of the church decide to organize an outing to a local skating rink, Bishop goes

"I want the members to feel they're a part of me," he says. "That's the drawing power; making people feel like people."

Bishop says he had to put a halt to his rigorous

revival schedule because of a need to settle down with his families: one at home, the other at church.

"I need to direct a lot more of my time to this church," Bishop says. "Revivals are inspirational but I have to build up the prayer meetings and Bible study services. I also counsel during the week, so I had to cut back."

Bishop founded the church's newly-formed Agape Inspirational Ensemble and a 10-minute junior church. He says Waughtown will continue to progress in the area of community service and he
