Leading off the Friday morning sessions was educator and author, Virginia Ramey Mollenkott. Also headlining the

sessions was Julia Esquivel, a Guatemalan poet and activist. "Focus Sessions" included topics on poverty, hunger, homelessness, work, exploitation, aging, ecology, family, youth, peacemaking/militarism, work with prisoners and education.

Women from 62 nations par-

ticipated in the assembly.

Church Women United is the national ecumenical movement bringing Protestant, Roman Catholic and Orthodox women together into a Christian "community of caring." It represents a broad spectrum of religious tradition, race, age, economic status and ethnic backgrounds. It works through a national unit, 52 state

units (including ones in greater Washington, D.C., and Puerto Rico) and 1,800 local units supporting human rights, justice, peace and the empowerment of women.

The organization's newly-elected president is Sylvia Talbot of Atlanta, a member of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.
