write wills. She also is co-chairperson of the program committee for the Winston-Salem Bar Association.

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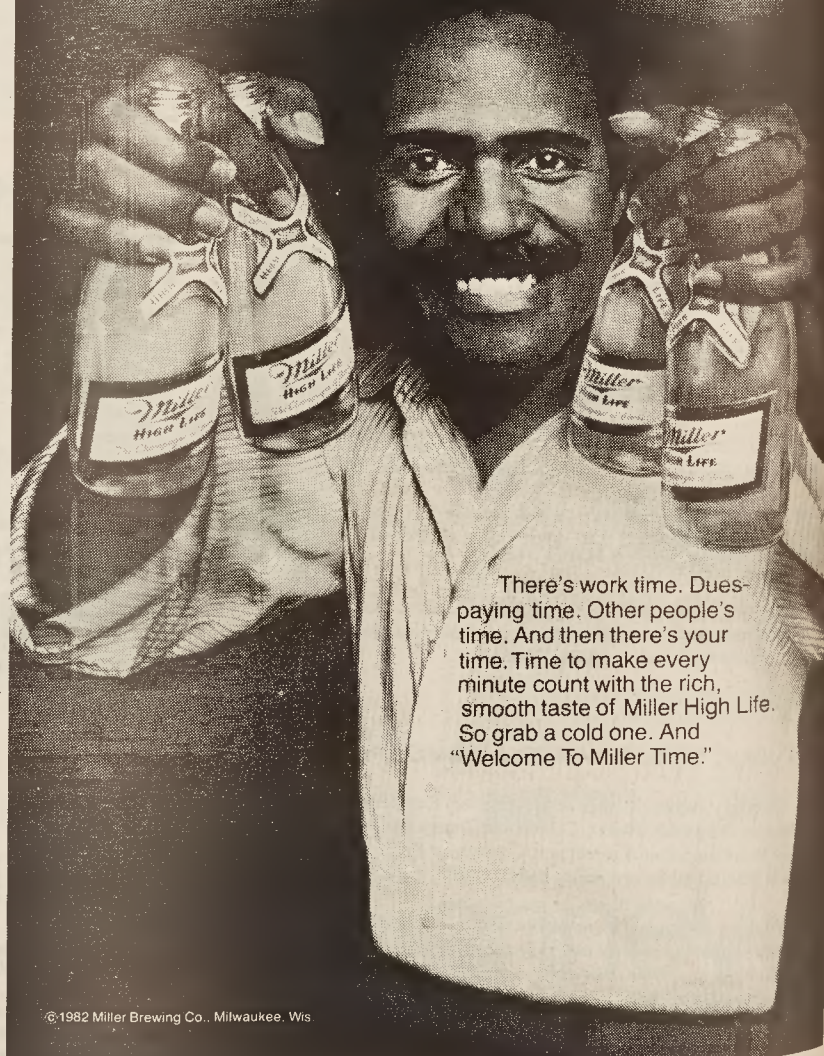
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
