Cheesecake perks up holiday meals

The holidays are time for special gatherings. Food holds the center stage, whether it be a cocktail party for 200 or a warm family dinner for 6. No matter how sophisticated the fare, everyone always asks the question, "What's for dessert?"

One of the simplest and most popular of today's desserts is the cheesecake. Cheesecakes can be prepared in advance and varied with different flavorings and toppings.

We suggest a Mocha Marble Cheesecake, a basic cheesecake laced with mocha swirls. This cheesecake is made with a prepared graham cracker crust, a real time-saver.

For a large party, make several pies and slice into narrow wedges. Place them on a large tray decorated with holly or festive ribbons for an easy-serving finger food dessert.

1 teaspoon vanilla

Beat cream cheese un

Beat cream cheese until soft and fluffy. Add sugar and vanilla. Add eggs one at a time, beating until well blended. Reserve 1/2 cup of the cream cheese mixture. Set aside. Pour remaining mixture into pie crust. Mix instant coffee and creme de cacao with reserved cream cheese mixture. Pour over cheesecake mixture and gently cut through mocha layer with a knife to give marbled appearance. Bake at 325° for 25-30 minutes. Cool and refrigerate for three hours or overnight before serving.
