"Adolescent attempts at suicide are a plea for help. They do not really want to die, but want to be saved from the life they are experiencing," Dr. Wagner says.

A CHILD'S THINKING

"While religious beliefs and symbolism can be very comforting to adults, abstract descriptions of death are very confusing to children," Dr. Frances Wagner, extension human development specialist, NCSU.

When told that a death was "God's will," children may direct their anger at abandonment toward God. Children informed that the deceased "was so good God took her to live with Him," may wonder whether they want to be good. God may take them away too.

If Heaven is depicted as "in the sky" or "up there", logical children may resist going up in an elevator for fear of going to Heaven before their time. Or a grieving child may want an airplane ride to see the dead.

THE FUNERAL

Should a child attend a funeral or interment? Should they be allowed to go when they are too young to understand it? Or should they not be allowed to go because they do understand death?

"In general, infants and

preschoolers should not attend the ceremonies because they may be disruptive or disturbed and confused by the weeping of the family and others. If you decide to take young children, explain in simple terms ahead of time what they should expect to happen,' recommends Dr. Wagner.

School-age children will probably want to attend and would benefit by going. Children thisage are typically interested in both the physical aspects and rituals of death.

Professional sweeps also can use special industrial strength vacuum cleaners to suck up debris as it falls from the flue. Home vacuums are not usually designed to handle the debris and dirt.

As for buying wood for your fireplace, the BBB recommends that homeowners understand what they are purchasing. A full cord of wood, the most common measure for firewood, is defined as a tightly stacked pile of wood four feet high, four feet deep and eight feet long. Seasoned wood is that which has been cut and has had at least six to nine months to dry. Any wood cut in the last few months will probably not be ready to burn until late winter.

Some tips to remember for maintaining a safe fire:

Some tips to remember for maintaining a safe fire:

- · do not use flammable li-
- · if you use synthetic logs. follow the instructions on the wrapper.
- keep a metal or glass screen in front of your fireplace.
- · don't use excessive amounts of paper to build roaring fires.
- · before you go to bed or leave the house, be sure your fireplace fire is completely out.
