## Joel honored at Fort Campbell

Military dignitaries, family and friends of the late Sgt. 1st Class Lawrence Joel gathered at Fort Campbell recently to dedicate a street to his memory.

Joel, a native of Winston-Salem, was the first black medic to receive the Medal of Honor. He was a medic aid with Head-

quarters and Headquarters Company of the 1st/503rd Infantry, 173rd Airborne Brigade during the Vietnam War and later served at Fort Campbell.

The circular drive at Blanchfield Army Community Hospital has been named Joel Drive in honor of the Vietnam veteran, who died last year.

In addition to naming the street for Joel, a 5-foot-high granite monument was dedicated on the grounds.

His wife, Dorothy Joel, attended the ceremony with their two children, Tremaine and Deborah.

## WSSU grads score high on nursing tests

The 1985 graduates of Winston-Salem State University's nursing school achieved a 92-percent passing rate on the state licensure examination administered in July. Twelve of the 13 graduates passed the exam on the first writing.

### 1985 NORTH WARD ALDERMAN DEMOCRAT

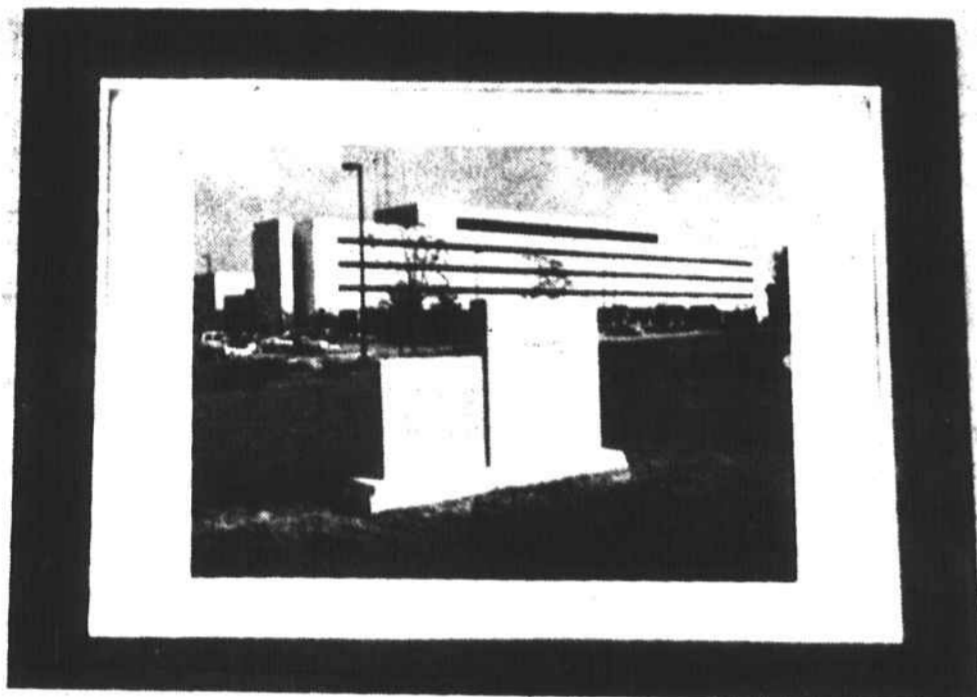

zones for minority and small businesses, relief for the North Ward's traffic woes and tax incentives for firms that provide certain types and numbers of jobs."

Our other choices in next Tuesday's contested primary races:

**SOUTHEAST:** Perhaps the only complaint you might lodge against incumbent Larry W. Womble is that he works too hard. Womble is our easiest endorsement and has served all the constituents in his racially mixed ward effectively, as hard as that may seem to be.

Where his unbridled energy comes from we don't know, but the aldermen certainly can use it for another four years.

**NORTHWEST:** Martha Wood is an open, diligent alderman who has served her ward and the city well during her first term. She works for her constituents

with a passion but also votes for what she feels is right -- even when that stand may not be politically expedient. Witness her decisive vote that paved the way for the city's enabling law. She deserves another term, and she'll get it, if voters know what's good for them.

Her opponent, Tom Brame, is a pleasant, likeable man, but he is not very aware of the issues.

**SOUTH:** Frank Frye has been involved in ward politics since 1973 and heads the Washington Park Neighborhood Association. In a campaign given to hyperbole, his thoughts on the issues are level-headed, realistic and well thought out, especially where zoning and the city's growth are concerned.

He would be a first-time alderman if he were elected, but he also would be a marked improvement over incumbent Ernestine Wilson.
