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Randleman, and she says that the future rests in young hands.

"It's important because they will be the leaders of the future, and in order to progress as a profession, you need to be aware of what issues are going to impact you and your profession," says the Winston-Salem State University graduate. "It's very important for blacks to get involved because they will replace some of the older members."

Mrs. Randleman is a model that young nurses should emulate, as she has been very active in her profession. After graduation from WSSU, Mrs. Randleman obtained a master of science in nursing degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and she has been nationally certified as a nurse administrator advanced.

At this week's convention, she will seek a nomination to become a delegate to the American Nursing Association convention, and during her 18-year career she has taken an active interest in issues confronting her profession.

Not being one to settle for the status quo, Mrs. Randleman says that she not only foresees changes in the field of nursing but anticipates some positive changes in the near future.

"I can see changes happening

now. Nursing has a wide evolution and history that we have been dealing with for some years," says Mrs. Randleman. "There are currently three major issues that are being studied. They are the image of nursing, the profession of nursing and education."

The education of nurses is something that Mrs. Randleman feels strongly about, and she says that within the next 10 years distinctions will be made between professional nurses and technical nurses.

Almost everyone has his own image of nurses, and Mrs. Randleman says the nursing association is hoping to modify and strengthen the image of nurses.

"The image of nurses is something that we're still struggling with," Mrs. Randleman says. "I can talk about the image from way back since Florence Nightingale's day. She probably has the most commonly known name in the community and within society in terms of nurses."

"Back in those days, nurses really didn't have the education," she says, "and often they were women of ill repute. Because the image of nursing started like that, we have had to overcome a lot of strife relating

to that image."

Mrs. Randleman also says that television has helped to distort the image of nurses, especially in the way they are portrayed on soap operas.

"We're struggling with that image. Nurses today are far better educated than they are portrayed on television," says Mrs. Randleman. "Nurses are capable of making high-level decisions,

and they have a high degree of intelligence."
