Holland called his group "the most militant white racist Klan organization in the South." He said the Southern White Knights are "opposed to violence," but "we believe in self-defense."

As evidence of King's "communist" links, Holland cited King's participation in sessions at structed activists in the labor and civil rights movements.

"It is a shame and a disgrace that the American people are honoring a known communist," Holland said.

Harris told the Klangroup that his policy is to reserve state property for activities marking the state holiday being celebrated. King's birthday is one of 12 state holidays.

Since activities already have been planned in commemoration of the King holiday, the Klan's request "is not appropriate and cannot be honored," the governor said.
