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Mistrial declared in Fuller case

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munity along racial lines.

The defense attorney, Douglas Miller, contended throughout the trial that the property (valued at about \$25,000) seized from the home of Fuller, and alleged to belong to her employees, was actually Fuller's property. The defense held that statements of confession, allegedly signed by Fuller, were signed under duress.

The defense contended that Fuller was functionally illiterate and did not know what she was signing, that she believed she was signing a list of items that she told police were given to her by the families she worked for. Miller said Fuller allowed detectives to search her home in the belief that they were searching for a \$24,000 necklace which one of the accusers

said was missing. The necklace was later found in the accuser's home.

The prosecution attempted to show that Fuller was literate and was only pretending not to be able to read. Sparrow showed the jury several documents that he said had been completed by Fuller. He tried repeatedly to get the defendant to read from documents during the course of the trial.

He produced high school records to show that Fuller received Bs and Cs in reading. The defense countered with testimony that the high school attended by Fuller was one for mentally retarded and slow learners. The defense produced documents that showed Fuller to have an IQ of 67.

The prosecution contended

that Fuller had a motive for stealing from the four families for whom she worked. Sparrow said the defendant had secured several loans that she was unable to repay. Sparrow also said Fuller had the opportunity and the ability to commit the crimes.

He contended that some of the items found in Fuller's home were so personal that it was not conceivable that anyone owning them

would give them away.

On Monday, there was one tense moment when Miller asked Judge Seay to excuse the jury and then accused the judge of showing bias and disrespect to the defense during the course of the trial. Miller said the judge was sending clear signals of bias to the jury with the inflections in his voice and the expressions on his face.

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Robinson challenges Ward, Kaplan

Vernon Robinson, 20th District Senate nominee, has challenged Democrat incumbents Marvin Ward and Ted Kaplan to run in the five-mile AT&T benefit run, Saturday, April 30, in Winston-Salem.

An assistant professor of business at Winston-Salem State University, Robinson stated in remarks to the press, "It isn't good enough to come up with innovative ideas like day care assistance and human capital investment.

Robinson is a 1977 graduate of the United States Air Force Academy.
