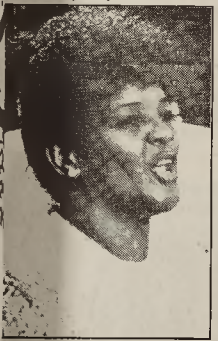

At 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 7, Mount Sinai Glorious Church of God will visit; Bishop L. Hines will be the speaker.

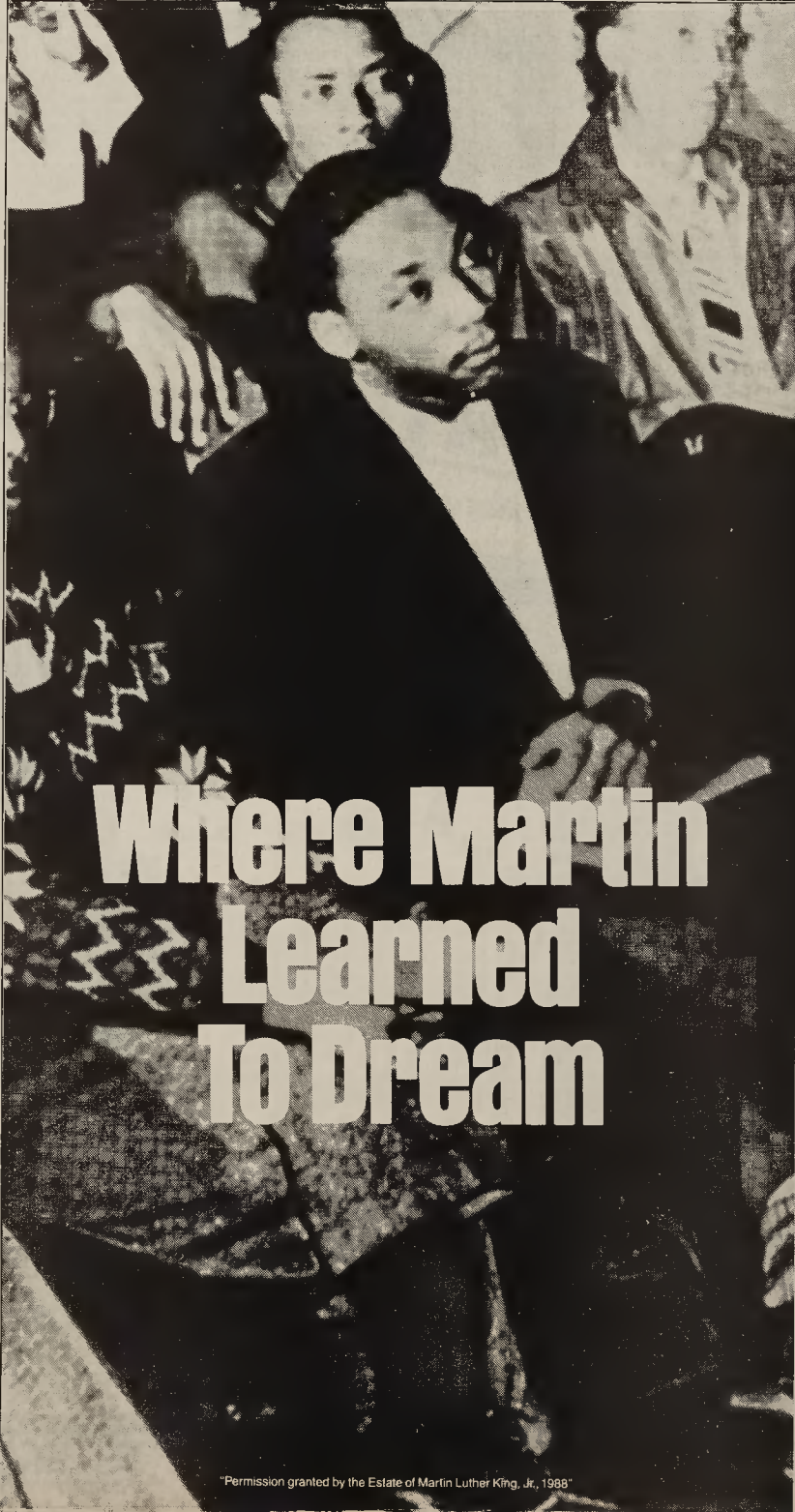
