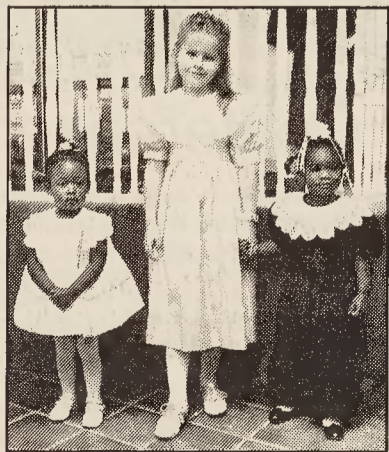
The prospective bridegroom is the son of Maceo and Olivia T. Burris of Winston-Salem.
