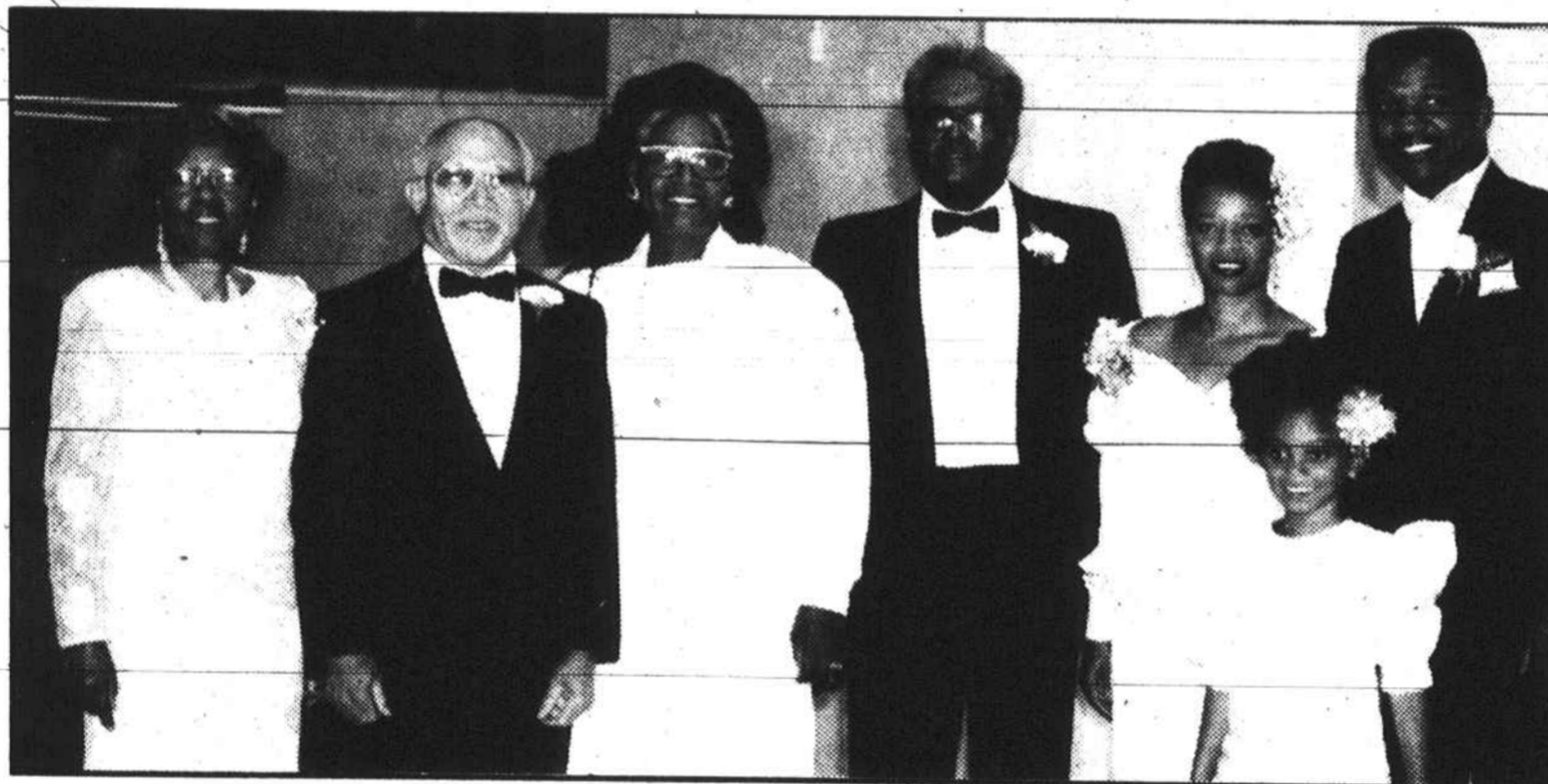
The two formal activities of the evening were passing through the receiving line and cutting the cake. The remainder of the evening was devoted to food, fellowship, and fun.
