Representatives from St. Augustine's College and Livingstone College, also member institutions, were also on hand to thank the audience for its support in the UNCF campaign.

The success of the UNCF ensures that the 41 predominantly black colleges and universities represented, continue to have access to the financial means nec-

essary to perpetuate the development of highly qualified graduates. UNCF exists to raise operating money for its member institutions so that they can continue to maintain the highest academic standards and prepare their graduates for the demanding professions.

Of the 41 member institutions, six are located in North Carolina. They are Barber-Scotia College, Concord; Bennett College, Greensboro; Johnson C. Smith University, Charlotte; Livingstone College, Salisbury; St. Augustine's College and Shaw University, Raleigh. These six institutions enroll over 7,000 students and

employ over 1,300 people. In 1990, these six institutions received \$4,581,274 from UNCF. This year's national goal for UNCF is \$54,600,000; the North Carolina state goal is \$1,215,000; and the Triad goal is \$180,000.
