Writers may not use monies from these programs for educational expenses and those pursuing undergraduate and graduate degrees are ineligible for the grants. Interested composers must apply by Feb. 1, 1992. Composer fellowships usually total \$8,000. Interested applicants must have resided in N.C. for at least one year. Recipients may not use these monies for educational expenses, and composers pursuing graduate or undergraduate degrees are ineligible. Arts Council, Department of Cultural Resources, Raleigh, N.C. 27601-2807, or call 733-2821. · Jazz composer fellowships are available from the N.C. Arts Council. Interested persons must apply by Feb. 1, 1992. Any N.C. jazz composer who has lived in the state at least one year and made substantial contributions to jazz contribution over the past five years may apply. 
