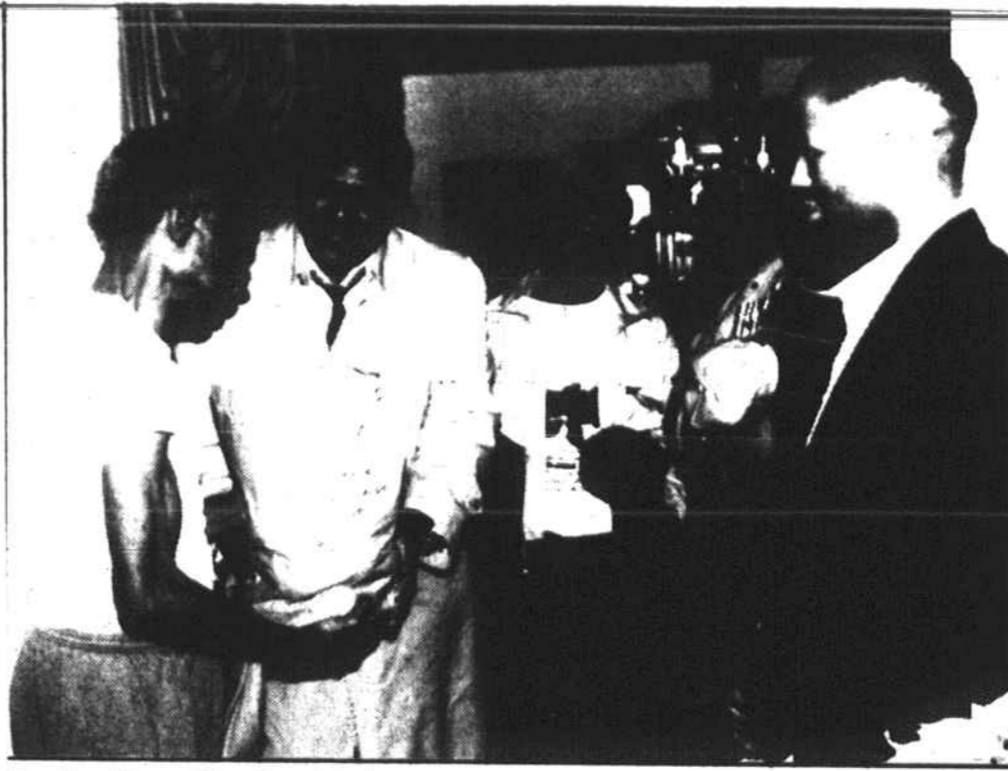

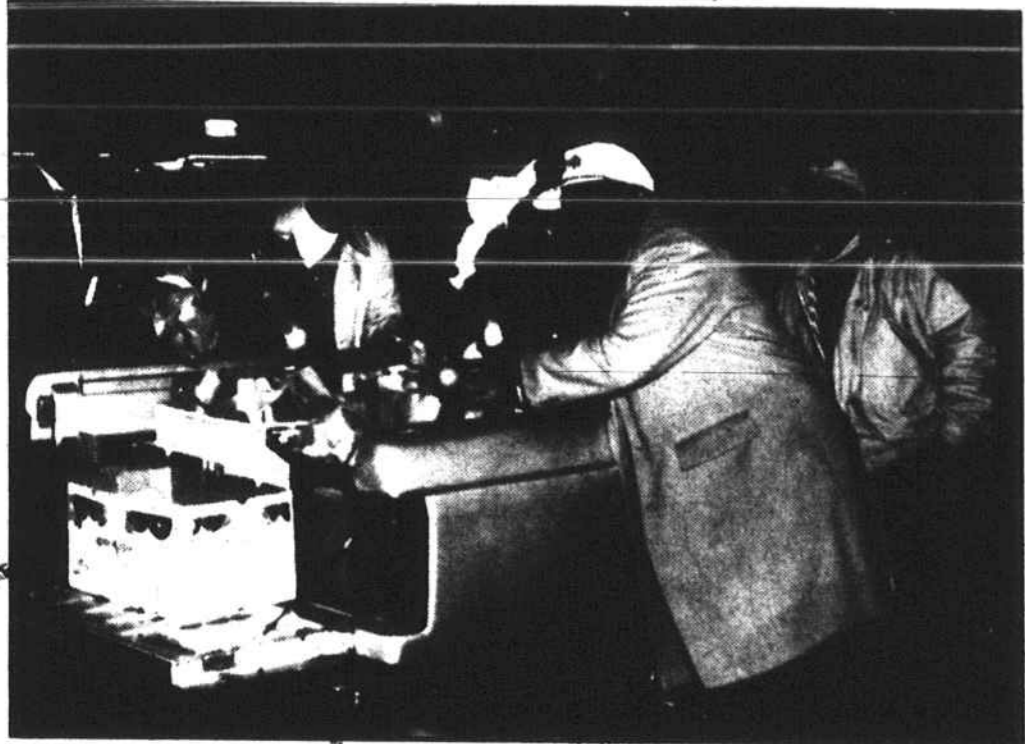

'Women in Public Service' series to run at UNCG

"Women in Public Service," a series of panel discussions and speakers focusing on the achievements of women in various areas of public service, will open at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 11, in the Alumni House at The University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

"Women in Elective Office" will be the first topic and Greensboro City Councilwoman Carolyn Allen will serve as moderator. Panelists will Dr. Katie Dorsett, member of the Guilford County Board of Commissioners; Becky Smothers, mayor pro tem of High Point; former Guilford County Commissioner Dot Kearns; Maggie Keese-Forrester, past president of the N.C. Women's Political Caucus and former state legislator.

A highlight of the series will be on Feb. 25 when Constance Berry Newman, director of the U.S. Office of Personnel Management since 1989, will be the featured speaker.

The series is a special offering held in observance of UNCG's Centennial. Sponsors are the UNCG College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Political Science and Master of Public Affairs degree pro-

gram. All events will take place on Tuesdays at 7:30 p.m. in the UNCG Alumni House and are open to the public at no charge.

"Given the history of UNCG in educating women for leadership and service in many areas, it is appropriate to hold a Centennial series that recognizes the accomplishments, as well as the difficulties, of women in public service," said Dr. Ruth DeHoog, a UNCG associate professor of political science and coordinator of the series.

"We have an outstanding group of UNCG alumni and distinguished guests will participate on the panels. And we are especially pleased to have Constance Berry Newman discussing women in public administration. We hope that all interested persons will attend."

Topics to be explored are career and leadership successes, opportunities, barriers, strategies and resources. Issues of public policy and societal change affecting women also will be examined. Other dates and speakers are:

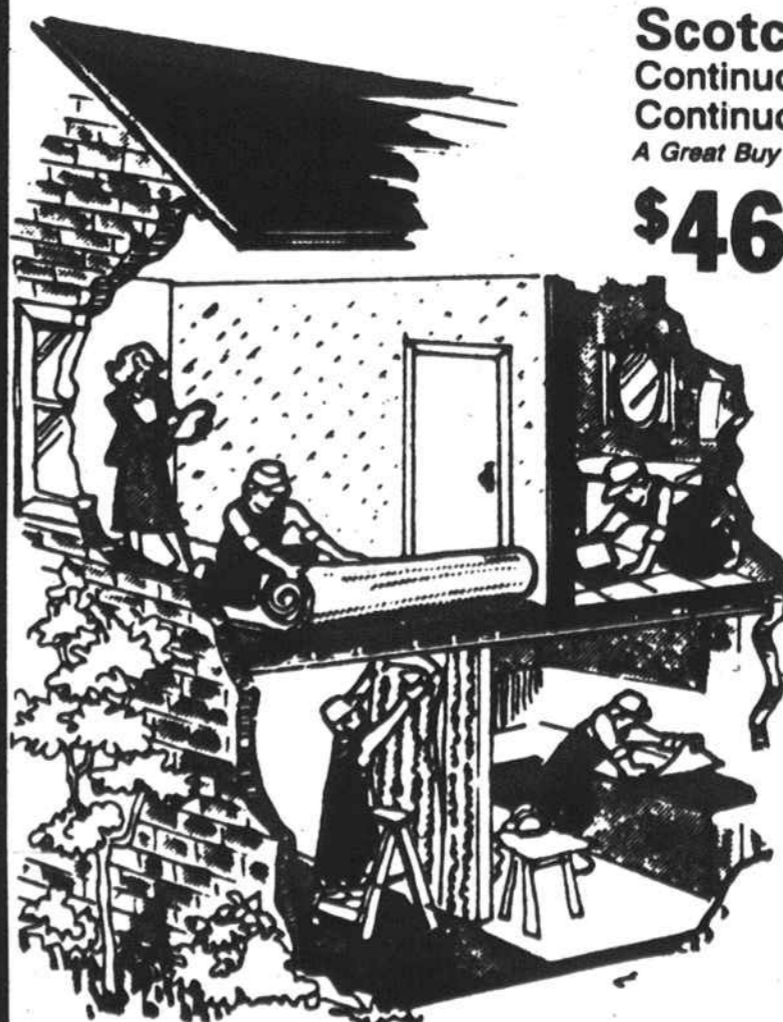
