- 1) He wrote "Up from Slavery."
- 2) He became CEO of the National Urban League in 1972.
- 3) Presented legal argument in the historic case *Brown vs. Board of Education*.
- 4) Wrote a book, fact and fiction, on Black History with his family as the basis.
- 5) Often referred to as "the mother of the civil rights movement."
- 6) Holds lifetime appointment at Wake Forest University.
- 7) Originator of the blood bank.
- 8) Eleanor Roosevelt's articles - "If I were a Negro" contributed to his success as a publisher.
- 9) Although he made many scientific discoveries, none were ever patented.
- 10) The only black with his birthday as a National Holiday.
- 11) A social scientist who has linked with communist groups in the 1950s.
- 12) Served as a United Nations official. The first black to win the Nobel Prize.
- 13) One of the pioneer advocates of Black Nationalism.
- 14) Current President of the National Urban League.
- 15) A Quaker and pacifist, he stood for civil rights through non-violence.
- 16) The first black woman elected to the U.S. Congress.
- 17) He wrote the highly symbolic novel, "The Invisible Man."
- 18) The first black elected to the Texas Senate since 1883.
- 19) Was with Martin Luther King Jr. when he was assassinated.
- 20) The famous "Conductor" of the "Underground Railroad."
- 21) One of the founders of the National Newspaper Publishers Association.
- 22) The first black to serve as a member of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).
- 23) The first black female millionaire.
- 24) Freed in 1827, she felt herself singled out for a divinely inspired crusade involving emancipation and womens liberation.
- 25) First black model to appear on cover of *Vogue* magazine.
- 26) Was "Dark Star" in the *Follies Bergere*.
- 27) Invented the gas mask and traffic light.
- 28) From the Cotton Club Chorus Line of 1933 to success on stage, in film and T.V., she has been called "the most beautiful woman in the world."
- 29) Served in the U.S. Navy and had a Naval Fighter Ship named for him.
- 30) The year Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation declaring the freedom of all slaves.
- 31) The year Congress authorized the enlistment of blacks for military service.
- 32) The first black to win an Oscar (1940).
- 33) The first year Fisk University opened in Nashville, Tenn.
- 34) When Malcolm X was killed in New York City.
- 35) The first black child born in the American Colonies (1621).
- 36) The first black General in U.S. history.
- 37) Snubbed by Adolph Hitler after winning five Gold Medals in the 1936 Olympics in Germany.
- 38) The first black to sing on the stage of the Metropolitan Opera House.
- 39) In 1939, she became the first black female judge in the United States.
- 40) The year the first black was elected to the City Council in Winston-Salem, N.C.
