At ceremonies in Durham, Professor Steven Vogel of the Duke University Zoology Department delivered the commencement address. Vogel described the ways in which the quantitative thinking that characterizes science will be crucial if we are to deal effectively with our social and environmental problems. He argued that the kinds of crises likely to afflict us will make a healthy scientific establishment as important in the future as any military establishment has been in the past.

Vanderbloemen ('93, Lenoir), who played the national anthem; John Lauve ('92, Morehead City) who delivered the student remarks; Class of 1992 member Rozana Carducci (Greensboro), who introduced the commencement speaker; and Timothy J.
