During the velebration, the organization will open an exhibition, "Wisston Salem Delta Fine Atts: The First 20 Years." At will show its activities and cultural contributions to the community from 1012 to 1092 Included in this exhibition are two pieces of turnitore by 19th century African-American cibrostmaker, Thomas Day, on toan from the N.C. Museum of History in Raleigh, In-1075, Winston-Salem Delta Fine Arts raised the funds for the museum to purchase 18 pieces of Day furniture for the museum's permanent collection. Also in the exhibition are painting by John Biggers and Romare Bearden, two of seven works by native North Carolina African-American artists which Winston Salem Delta Fine Arts has purchased and donated to Winston Salem State University for its permanent collection. The exhibition will be on view through 100 15 1000

During the party, Winston-Salem Delta Line Arts will unveil a poster of one of the Biggers murals. The artists, John and James Biggers, will be present to autograph posters. A mural post card will be on sale, also, In 1989. Winston Salem Delta Fine Arts commissioned John Biggers to paint two 30 foot by 15 foot mutals for the atrium of the C.G. O'Kelly Library at Winston Salem State University. The murals were completed in 1992 and presented to the university last March.

In 1982, Winston-Salem Delta Fine Arts opened the Delta Arts Center. 


