The 1993 National Black Theatre Festival, to be held in Winston-Salem Aug. 2-7, is seeking an additional \$300,000 to break even. Larry Leon Hamlin, the producer and artistic director of the festival, has sent out an appeal to local businesses for financial support.

"Several corporations and businesses have shown their commitment to the arts," said Hamlin. "This year's festival is larger and more expensive, with a total cost of \$1,000,000. We need additional financial support. Our target date for raising the additional funds is July 23.


The Martin Luther King Jr. community center recently dedicated and renamed its 2nd Annual Basketball League in honor of Alderman Nelson Mal-
