Former Rams Football Coach Sheppard Dies

Davie Lewis Sheppard, a former assistant football coach at Winston-Salem State University who came under scrutiny when he applied for the head coaching job last year, died Sept. 11. He was 42.

Sheppard suffered a massive heart attack while jogging near his Belmont, Mass. home. He was eulogized on Sept. 17 at Shiloh Baptist Church in Williamston, his home-

Sheppard was the offensive coordinator under former WSSU Coach Bill Hayes and also served as a counselor in the school's guidance office from 1983-1988.

Last December, when WSSU was looking for a new head football coach to replace Pete Richardson, Sheppard was the first one interviewed for the position. It was believed by some who were critical of the search committee that school officials and Sheppard supporters were attempting to name him to the post without considering other qualified candidates. Sheppard was passed over for the position after it was revealed that he had lost his job at Williams College because of allegations of sexual harassment.

Sheppard was a graduate of Guilford College, where he was a record-setting tailback from 1969-1971. In 1981, he earned a master's degree in secondary education from Tufts University.

Mutter Evans, owner of WAAA radio station and who knew Sheppard from grade school, described him as a man who "loved people, was unselfish and loved challenges."

"He was a lifelong friend," said

Evans, a Williamston native.

Sheppard is survived by his wife, Cheryl Myers Sheppard and a 9-year-old daughter, Margaux.

The Winston-Salem Chronicle is hosting its first annual Gospel Contest to showcase traditional gospel music and to keep it alive in the black community.

Al Martin, a 27-year gospel music disc jockey and contest cochairman, said traditional gospel music was chosen because it is the foundation for contemporary music.

When you talk about traditional music, you're talking about back in slavery times," Martin said. "That's where gospel music originated. When there was nothing but clapping of hands and stomping the

are entering not to compete, but because they love down-home gospel music.

On Oct. 4, the first night of the contest, five local choirs will perform: Mt. Olive Baptist Church Mass Choir, Ambassadors for Christ Choir, SBC Gospel Choir, Christ Rescue Temple Mass Choir and the Spirit of Life Community

Rev. Charles E. Gray, pastor of Mt. Olive Baptist Church, said the 60-member choir has been practicing each night.

"We're excited about being in it," Gray said. "I wish there would be more of it.'

Gray said the choir released an album three months ago entitled Let God Be God, and they are also planning to record again soon.

The Ambassadors for Christ Choir, headed by David L. Allen,

has attracted many local choirs who recently landed a third-place finish among 10 other choirs at a national competition in Chicago. The 50member choir has recorded several albums featuring guest appearances by Shirley Caesar, Darryl Coley, James Moore and others.

SBC (Shiloh Baptist Church) Gospel Choir has focused on traditional gospel music since its beginning in 1972. Choir director Eddie Bines said the 50-member choir. entered the contest to help spread traditional music.

"I don't look at the choir's talent in a competitive nature," he said. "If we win first place — and I hope we do - we will donate it back to the

youths, whose ages range from 5 to 23, represent 80 different churches. Allen said they recently backed up Michael Bolton's Winston-Salem concert and appeared on BET's Bobby Jones Gospel Hour last summer. In addition to recording an album, they have performed with Be Be and Ce Ce Winans, Trumaine Hawkins and the Winston-Salem Symphony.

Although the style of music is designed to attract the older crowd, Allen says it could be a family affair even for youths.

Each of the five groups will be allowed 15 minutes to perform, and they will be allowed to use instruments. Also, Martin said, The Mighty Wonders gospel group will make a special guest performance.


"I don't think you can beat traditional gospel music," Martin said. "We're just going to have a good The 100-member group of time singing and praising the Lord."
