CHAPEL HILL — In an effort to drum up broad-based support for two education-bond referendums totaling \$560 million, University of North Carolina President C.D. Spangler and minority

members of the university's Board of Governors met last week with about a dozen publishers and executives from the state's black-owned newspapers.

A church minister and community leader barely escaped with his life last Saturday night when a woman, standing in the living room of her home, fired sev-

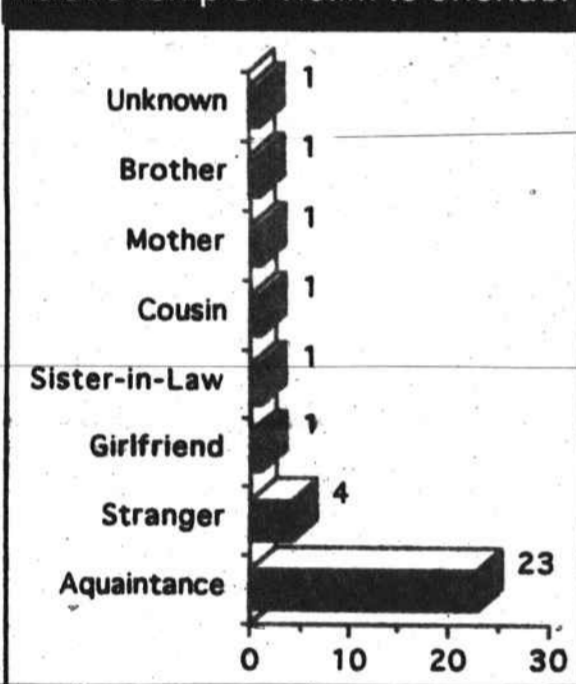
eral shots at him, police said.

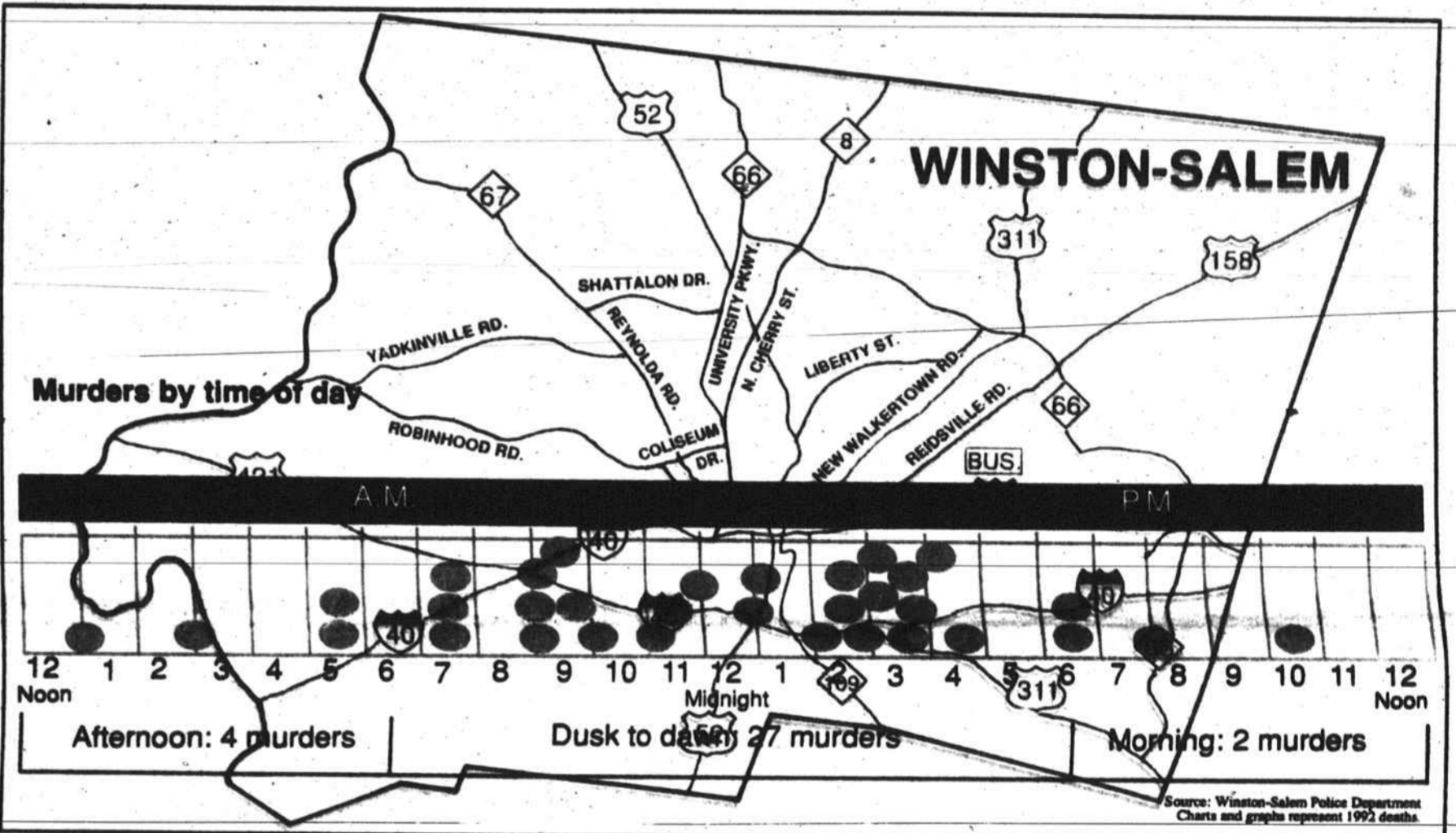

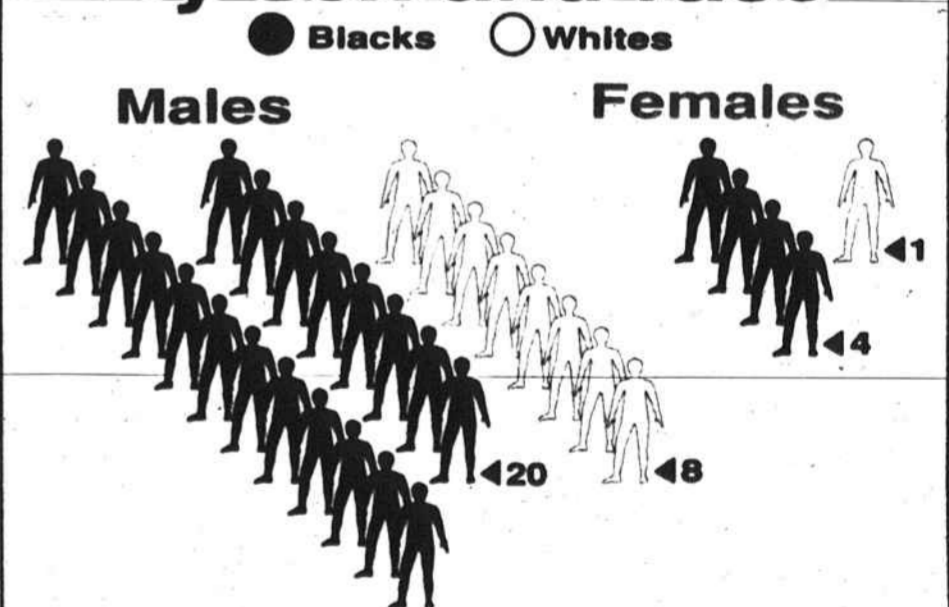

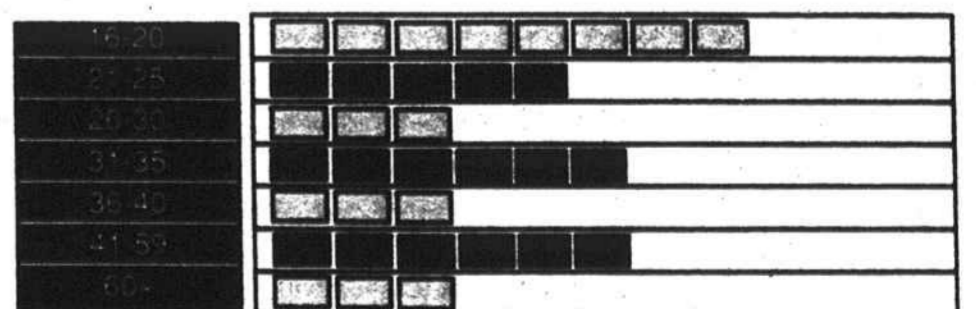

## Will Summer Violence Lead To Record Year for Deaths?

This past summer was one of the deadliest in the city's history. And in all likelihood, the summer violence will cause the city to set a record for homicides.

Last week's shooting death of 28-year-old Van Johnson, of 5205 Oakridge Court, marked the city's 30th homicide this year. By this time last year, only 28 homicides had been committed in the city. At this rate, the city will likely pass last year's total of 33.

Johnson was shot around midnight Thursday while visiting a female friend, Police Lt. Larry Revis said. Three men, forced their way into her home at 2814 Man-

chester St. and shot him to death while the female friend and her son watched in horror.

Neighbors in the community say they are living in fear. In April, Ulysses A. Morrison died from having his throat cut less than
