Host Families Needed for Foreign Teens

Foreign high school students will be arriving soon into the area for homestays, and the sponsoring organization urgently needs a few more local host families for their upcoming second semester programs.

Foreign students in the Pacific Intercultural Exchange (PIE) are between the age of 15 and 18, have their own spending money, are fully insured and are anxious to share their cultural experience with their new American families.

PIE currently has programs to match almost every family's needs, ranging in length from a semester to a full academic year, where the students attend local high schools.

PIE representatives match students with host families by finding common interest and lifestyles

through an informal in home meeting. Prospective host families are able to review student applications and select the perfect match.

PIE can fit a student into just about any situation, whether it be single parent, a childless couple, a retired couple or a large family.

Families who host for PIE are eligible to claim a \$50 per month charitable contribution deduction on their itemized tax returns for each month they host a sponsored student.

For the upcoming programs, PIE has students from Spain, German, Poland, Russia, Italy, Argentina, Brazil, Columbia, Paraguay, Australia, New Zealand, France and many other countries.

PIE is a non-profit, educational organization that has sponsored

more than 18,000 students from 8 countries since its founding in 1975. PIE is designated by the United States Information Agency and is listed by the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel (CSIET), certifying that the organization complies with the standards set forth in CSIET's Standards for International Educational Travel programs.

The agency also has travel/study program opportunities available for American high school students as well as possibilities for community volunteers to assist and work with area host families, students and schools.

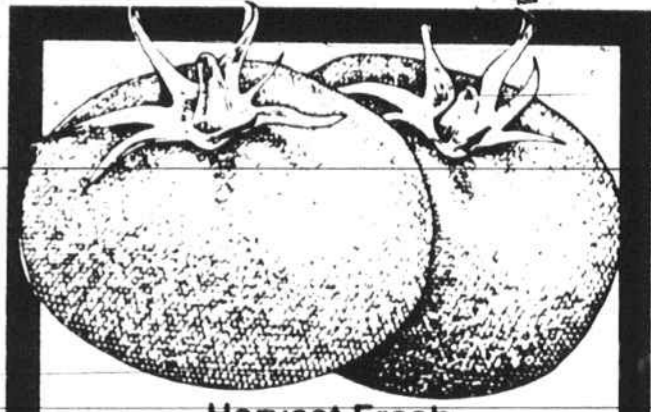
