The public is invited to come and witness this most inspiring program.

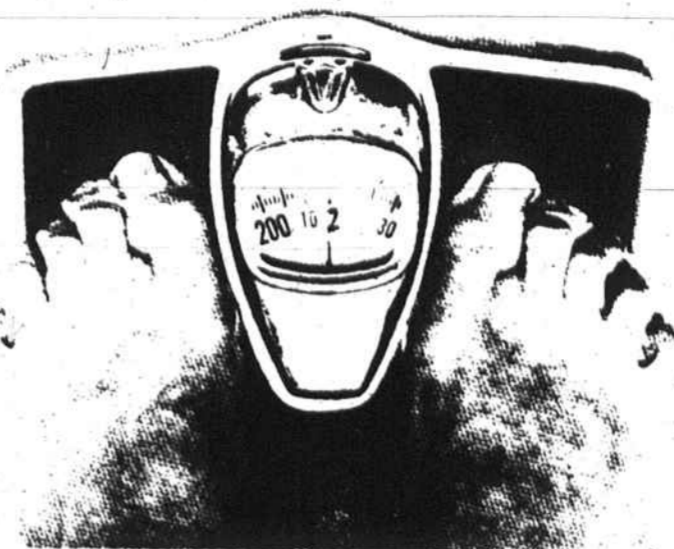

CHURCH HISTORY - Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thine ways acknowledge Him and He shall direct thy paths. This is what a group of Christian people did when God led them to establish MOUNT OLIVE BAPTIST CHURCH in 1909.

Our first place of worship was a store front building on South Ridge Avenue. We rented the building for several years and burned the mortgage in 1921. In 1934 the building was torn down and a new building erected. The construction of 1-40 and 52 caused us to relocate. On September 5, 1954 we marched from the building on South Ridge to our present location. The first pastor the was Rev. McQuater. Following the Rev. McQuater were several pastors. Under the leadership of these pastors, God brought Mount Olive a mighty long way.

On April 7, 1979, the Rev. Charles E. Gray was called as pastor. Under his leadership, we are in the process of beautifying our church. So far we have paneled the Fellowship Hall, tiled the floor, paneled and furnished a new Pastor's Study, remodeled the ushers' and choir rooms. Further, we have installed new lights and a new sound system in the sanctuary. We have purchased two new vans and a 50 foot lot that we have used to expand our restrooms and kitchen facilities. We have expanded our church, added a new baptismal pool, sixteen pews, and extended our choir stand. We have upholstered our pews and installed stained glass windows. Due to the growth of Mt. Olive we are presently in the process of renovating again. This time our sanctuaries will seat at least 250 people on each side of the church. Our restrooms, Pastor's Study, and choir room are also being remodeled.

Since the Rev. Gray has been our Pastor, our membership has grown from 110 to 1,330. We have formed a Spiritual Choir, and Evangelism Class, B.T.U., Youth Department, and Helping Hands Auxiliary. It should be noted that we have recently released our first album - "Let God Be God", composed by Rev. C.E. Gray. Since the release of our album, the Lord has inspired Michael Gray to write the play, which is also entitled - "Let God Be God." This is truly anointed play that everyone should see.

Our Sunday School and Ushers are strongly represented in District and State Organizations. With all the work we have done so far, and we will do in the future, nothing will ever be more important than bringing lost souls to Christ.
