As clowns, persons dressed in various animal costumes, and fairy-tale characters, such as Tweedle-Dee, mingled with the children, refreshments of hot-dogs, chips, cookies, and drinks were served to the anxious crowd.

As the pastor, the Rev. J.C. Hash Sr., tried to prepare everyone for the hunt, he made the mistake of saying, "When I say ready, set, go, then go for it." All those little ears heard the magic words: READY, SET, GO; and off they flew, about 300 of them. What a joy

After gathering all the goodies, each child was given a bag of treats, prizes, and toys to take home; so no one left empty handed. It was truly a day of parent/child participation and fun!

The purpose of this organization is "to be more helpful to our husbands through the exchange of ideas, talents and fellowship."


