Ceiling Fans Can Provide Comfort During Spring And Fall

Ceiling fans have continued to be popular, practical and durable. Ceiling fans can provide comfort when outside temperatures are cooler than indoor temperatures, such as Spring and Fall months or milder Summer evenings and days. Unlike the wholehouse fan, they do not draw in air from the outside; instead they circulate air within the room. As air moves across your body, a wind chill factor makes you feel 4 to 6 degrees cooler.

Ceiling fans can be used effectively with or without the air conditioning in operation. One of the benefits of the ceiling fan is that it allows you to raise the thermostat setting on the air conditioning system 4 to 6 degrees higher and still maintain a level of comfort because

of the circulating air. An example of the energy saving for a 5-degree difference in temperature follows: to operate a 3-ton air conditioning unit costs about \$550 each cooling season if set on 75 degrees. If the thermostat setting can be raised to 80 degrees, you are still comfortable using a ceiling fan, the cost of operating the air conditioner alone will drop to \$399 (a saving of \$151). On the average, a ceiling fan uses about the same amount of electricity as a 100-watt light bulb.

You can run one for 10 hours for about eight cents. If the ceiling fan ran for 10 hours each day for a month, the energy cost would be \$2.40. Ceiling fans have no cooling effect on unoccupied space, so they should be turned off when occupants leave the room.

Ceiling fans can be decorative. They come in wood tones, brass, and painted in various colors. They come with lights with globes, Tiffany styles and chandelier styles.

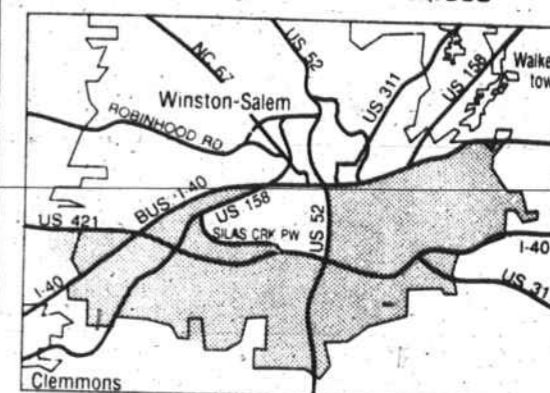

South Sector of Winston-Salem

The City-County Planning Board of Forsyth County and Winston-Salem recommended for approval to the elected boards on March 11, 1993, the text of the UNIFIED DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCES. These new development regulations will create new zoning districts, setbacks, minimum lot sizes, permitted uses, use conditions, and other revised requirements. The Official Zoning Maps for Forsyth County, Winston-Salem, Clemmons, and Kernersville must be changed in conjunction with the text of the new Zoning Ordinance to replace existing zoning districts with new comparable zoning districts for all property in these jurisdictions. There will be public informational drop-in sessions for Forsyth County, Winston-Salem, Clemmons, and Kernersville by sectors. All property owners as recorded in the Forsyth County tax listings in the South Sector of Winston-Salem (shaded area on map) have been mailed a Notification of Zoning District Map Conversion Hearings.
