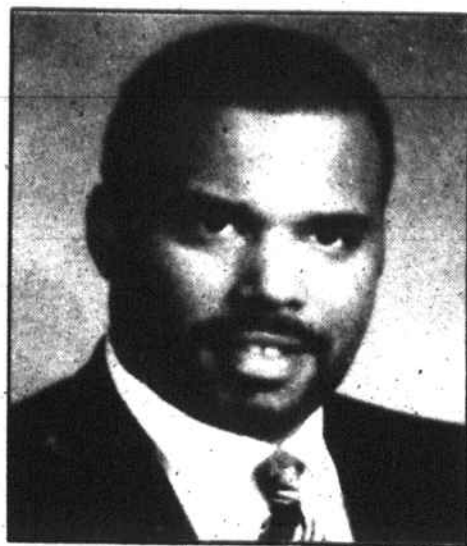

Senior Services Inc. Receives Grant

Senior Service, Inc. has been awarded a matching grant of \$30,000 by the Winston-Salem Foundation to help improve fund raising and community awareness of its programs.

Executive Director Richard Gottlieb said that Senior Service will receive one dollar from the foundation for every two dollars it raises in new and increased gifts from the community.

"This comes at a good time for us because this month we begin our annual campaign," Gottlieb said. "Last year, more than 1,500 individuals, businesses, foundations, civic groups, churches and other participated in the campaign.

We increased our service last year, but we still have people on our waiting lists."

Gottlieb said that a study completed earlier this year by the Forsyth County Aging Services

Advisory Committee pointed out an increasing shortfall in service to the elderly.

The report revealed needs in transportation, housekeeping, home health care, home-delivered meals, adult day care and home safety improvements as well as referrals for services.

Senior Service operates the community's Meal on Wheels program, provides adult day care services, conduct assessments leading to personalized health care plans for individuals, provides in-home personal care and acts as information and referral agents for the elderly.

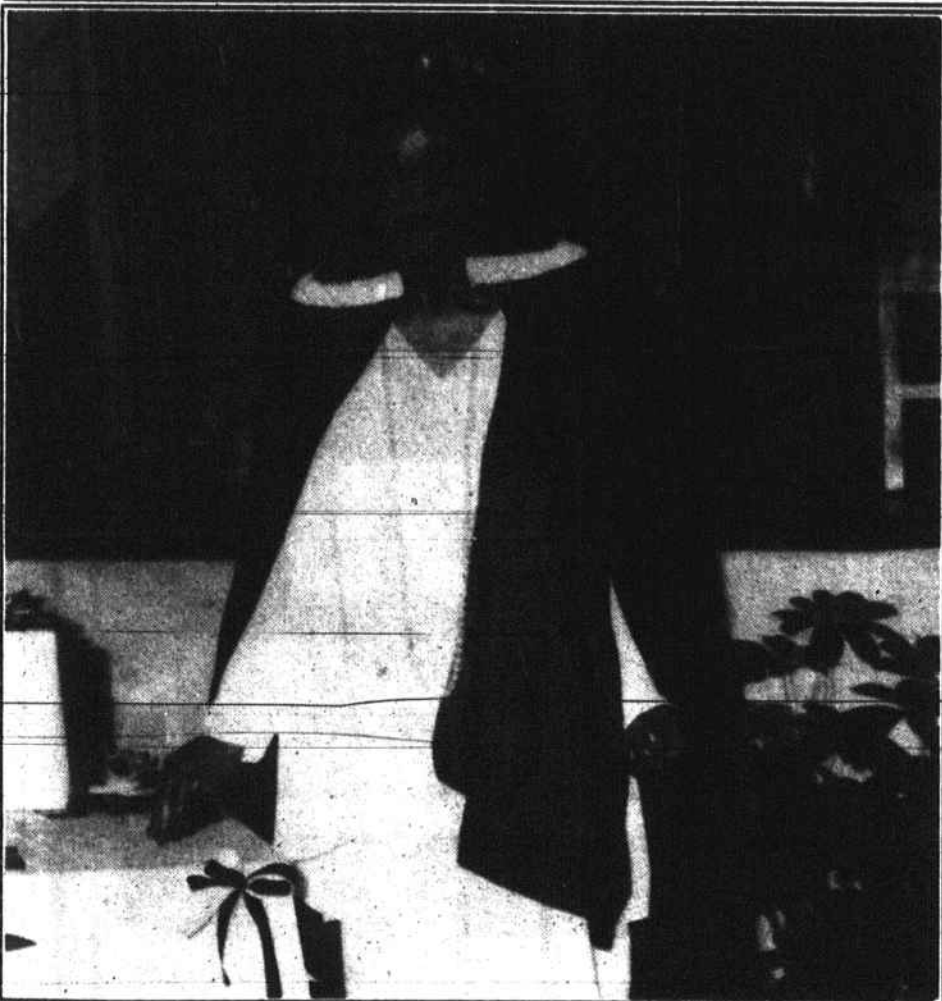
