Clinton has appointed three African-American sports, fitness, and community leaders as members of the President's Council of Physical Fitness and Sports,

African-American The Olympic long-jump gold medalist, women's pro tennis star Zina Garrison-Jackson and former pro football player Calvin Hill.

The president also appointed 12 other council members from diverse backgrounds. In selecting the 15 appointees to the 20 member council, President Clinton sought individuals from a wide range of backgrounds with outstanding records of leadership and community involvement.

The three newly appointed African Americans will join PCPFS co-chair Joyner and Tom McMillen, who were appointed by President Clinton in June of last year. All of the newly appointed African Americans have been active in their communities, working on behalf of inner-city and disadvantaged citizens.

> Ralph Boston, of Atlanta and Tennessee, is a gold Medal winner and silver medal winner in the long jump at the 1960 Olympics in Rome, where he surpassed Jesse Owens' 25 year long jump record with a mark of 26 feet, 11 1/4 inches. He won a silver medal in Tokyo in 1964 and a bronze medal in Mexico City in 1968, making him the only long jumper in the world to have own a set of Olympic gold, silver and bronze medals. Boston also won gold medals at the 1963 and 1967 pan American Games, setting new Pan American records at both.

> Garrison-Jackson of Houston, Texas, was unable to attend the White House Rose Garden ceremony because she was competing in the French Open tennis tournament in Paris, an event she flew directly

to from her high school graduation. NFL Pro Bowl in 1969, 1972, 1973 ceremony in 1982, and which was her first pro tournament. Garrison-Jackson is one of the highest ranking American women in professional tennis, and also the most prominent African-American women on the pro circuit. A Houston native. she launched The Zina Garrison All Court Tennis Academy, an innercity youth program, in 1992. In 1993, she added another program to her agenda of community service by signing on with Kid Care. Inc. in Houston, an organization that delivers hot food to homeless and indigent children.

Her professional career has had many highlights, among them triumphantly representing the United States in the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, Korea with a bronze medal in singles and a gold medal in doubles. By 1981 she was the number one ranked junior player in the world, having won both the Junior U.S. Open and the Junior Wimbledon.
