HAWS May Lose \$3 Million

▲ Bill would cut \$7 Billion From HUD Funds

The full House Appropriations Committee has voted to cut about \$7.2 billion from the budget of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

These proposed cuts, called "rescissions" would in effect take back money previously approved by Congress, money that communities

throughout North Carolina have been counting on for this year.

North Carolina communities, including Asheville, Charlotte, Greensboro, Winston-Salem and Raleigh will lose millions in federal housing and community development funds if Congress adopts these cuts approved Feb. 23 by the House Appropriations Subcommittee on VA/HUD.

"The loss of these funds in midstream of the

budget without any warning will be devastating to thousands of low-income people in North Carolina and elsewhere around the nation," said HUD Secretary Henry G. Cisneros.

Winston-Salem will be hard hit, losing more than \$3 million in the area of public housing, which includes modernization funds that will

Winston-Salem Chronicle publisher Ernie Pitt described Woman of the Year Vivian Turner as "quiet as the proverbial church mouse."

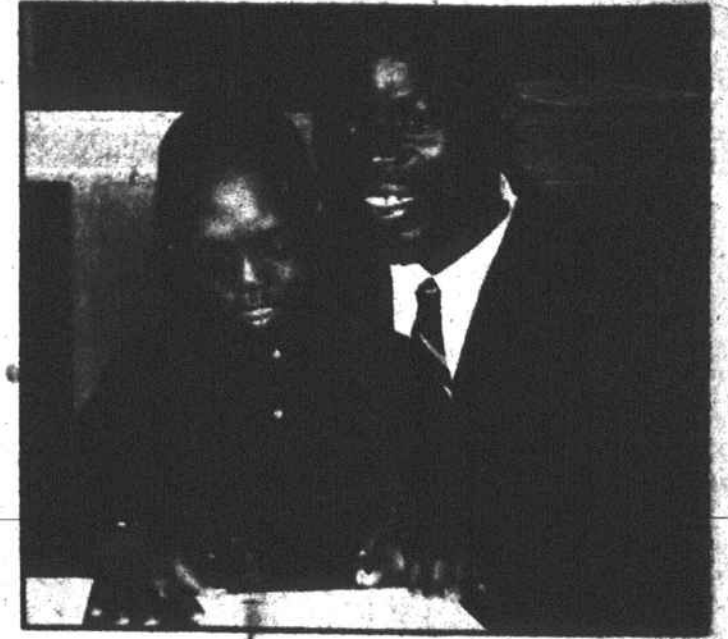
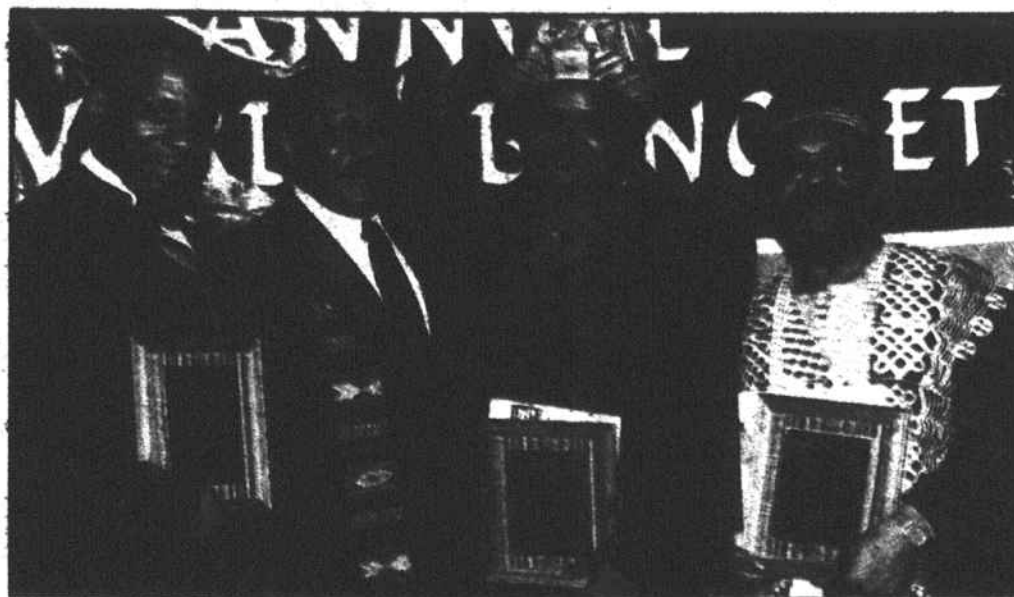
"She is one who will put her reputation on the line so organizations in the community can get a little piece of the pie," he said. "She's bringing people back to reality

Boy's Father Only Hope For Survival

Mike Cherry's father Donny Montgomery is not a perfect match for the 4-year-old's bone marrow transplant. But it's his only chance for survival.

Within a week Cherry and his father and mother Angela Cherry will travel to South Carolina so that Mike can undergo the procedure that could possibly save his life.

The \$300,000 procedure is a lot of money, but Mike's parents also have to worry about food and lodging during the hospital stay which will be at least 100 days.

Mexico Could Mean Opportunity for Minorities

Opportunities in Mexico abound for American businesses, according to the President and CEO of Contract Office Furnishings Thomas P. Trollinger.

Even though Mexico is in the throes of an economic crisis, the climate is likely to improve rapidly, said Trollinger.

Trollinger and his wife, Kaye, were among the 136 business people, educators and others who traveled with Gov. James B. Hunt Hunt to Mexico on a

full-scale trade mission. Trollinger is a member of the North Carolina Economic Development Board where he chairs the Minority and Small Businessman Enhancement Committee.

Also while in Mexico, the Governor officially opened the Latin America office which will help American companies get established there.

As a result of the North American Free Trade Agreement, (NAFTA), Americans are now able to own busi-
