Questions & Answers on recovering from grief *

Questions asked during bereavement counseling are answered by the editor of Afterloss, the grief-recovery letter.

Q. When will I stop crying? It's beginning to be embarrassing.

A. Crying is not a measure of one's grief. There are all kings of appropriate reactions to loss and one of them is crying. If you don't feel like crying, however, that's all right too. Certain personalities cry when they are hurt, others do not. If the tears are there, let them fall rather than choking them back...they have cleansing value. Tears will come as long as they need to. On the other hand, if no tears come, please don't feel obligated to force them
