♦ Lesson Aims: Understand Stephen's ministry and affirm the work of the Holy Spirit.

♦ Background:

The followers of Jesus have been growing in number since

the Ascension. By this time, the apostles need help in carrying out all of the ministries. In Acts 6: 1-17, The servants (deacons or stewards) are called. All of them were Hellenists (Greek). Their responsibilities are to minister to the widows and serve tables. Stephen is one of the seven called.

◆ The Lesson: The scripture opens with good confronting evil when Stephen, a man full of faith and power, is doing great works and miracles for the Lord. These were always signs of God's grace and power being with people. The Jews do not like Stephen because of his power. There arises envy and jealousy among them. The Jews are doing all that they can to stop the growth of this new group (followers of Jesus). Stephen is apprehended and brought to the Sanhederin (Jewish court with no real power). There are false witnesses who accuse Stephen of blasphemy (speaking lightly or carelessly about God). As the council members hear the accusation, they look at him. His face is like Moses' after he

came down from the mountain. Stephen offers his defense as he looks toward heaven. The council members begin to yell and scream, closing their ears, **◆** Application:

As present day servants, we are confronted with situations where a stand must be taken. If we analyze the lesson, Stephen was falsely accused, then stoned, and he asked that the people not be charged with their crime. Powerful! We too will be falsely accused, trapped and attacked by the mob (from outside and within the church). What response are we to make?

Like Stephen, we are to "do the right thing." Even when the consequences are grave, we must see it through. In the face of opposition, do we lose sight of our aim? Do we quit? No, with the love of Jesus, the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we stand. We stand because God will hold us accountable. We stand because of Jesus' redeeming blood. We stand because we are committed. We Stand!! Eyen unto death.


