RALEIGH Governor-elect Mike Easley and the state's top elect-ed officials will take office on Saturday, Jan. 6, in an 11 a.m. ceremony launching a day-long family-orient-ed festival in downtown Raleigh.

"Celebrate One North Carolina" will begin at 10:30 a.m. with an inaugural morning concert at the Archives and History State Library presented by the Jam Band from N.C. Central University, Mike Easley's alma mater and where

Swearing-in ceremony performers include the 440th Army National Guard band, the N.C. Theatre's Kids on Broadway chorus, and the Mount Zion Baptist choir. Broad-way star Terrence Mann, who originated the role of the Beast in "Beauty and the Beast," will give a special reading.

After the swearing-in, the gover-nor and the Council of State will proceed on foot - rather than the traditional car procession - from the

State Library to the parade-viewing stand on the Capitol. The N.C. State University Pipe and Drum Corps will lead them to the stand.

About 50 acts from throughout the state are expected in the parade, "Our acts are meant to represent including military and high school our state, from the seven Native marching bands, the Silver Chalice Boat from Roanoke island and two entries from the state's community colleges: the Catawba Valley Community College Racing Team and the Wilson Community College Heavy Equipment Project.
