Community, pastors, friends, parents of inmates, children of inmates and ex-offenders came together in prayer, praises and the Word at Grace United Community Baptist Church, where Joseph Parks is pastor The prayer revival was an electrifying one for those who haven't seen miraculous things happen. Inmate families cried out because people cared about their sons and daughters who are incarcerated. Youths of the incarcerated sang praises to the Lord and joined in with prayer.
