Dr. Brad Braxton is the Jessie Ball duPont assistant professor of homiletics and biblical studies at the Divinity School at Wake Forest. He is the author of two books, "The Tyranny of Resolution: I Corinthians 7:17-24" and "No Longer Slaves: Galatians and African American Experience. Braxton has also published sermons and a recent essay on the role of the black church in the

new millennium.

In addition to his teaching and scholarly activities, he is a frequent guest preacher and lecturer in local churches.

The service will be held in the restored historic St. Philips. Church building, which was erected in 1861. The building sat empty from 1952 to 1989. when Old Salem Inc. restored it and created an exhibit on the lives of African-Americans in Salem.
