The main thrust of events planned include a farmers market, historic home and garden tours memorabilia of the "good of days," period exhibitors and vendors, front-porch artists, children's games and crafts, and food. One thing that makes this event so different from other celebrations of the holiday is the historic home and garden tours. Some of the finest 18th century homes in the area will be on display. Many of the residents are descendants of the original settlers

The town of Bethania celebration on July 3 complements events in Old Salem and Bethabara on July 4, all in celebration of the 250th anniversary of the Moravian settlement of the Wachovia tract. The Wachovia tract comprises the bulk of Forsyth County. Bethania, a National Historic Landmark, was the first "planned community" in Wachovia, preceding Old Salem. Bethania also was the first N.C. town to celebrate Independence

Here's an excerpt from the Bethania Historical Association newsletter:

The history of July 4 as described in the records as a great cloud lifted from the people of America. The official notice ending the American Revolution was received with great joy. The North Carolina Governor issued proclamation "calling upon all good people to fittingly celebrate this event." We know of two congregations that complied.

"In Bethania, the band ush-ered in the first fourth of July (July 4, 1783) with an early morning recital. A prayer service at ten o'clock featured an exposition on Psalm 46. A lovefeast that afternoon attracted many Bethania neighbors. That evening residents marched through the village in

candlelight procession. To get to the celebration in Bethania on July 3, take Reynolda Road (N.C. 67) north to the first traffic light past Old Town School, turn right on Bethania Road and right on Main Street. Park at Bethania Moravian Church.
