Anthony: Was the NBA as tough as you thought it was going to be? What was the toughest part about being in the league? Josh: I think the toughest part for me to get over



As a professional, Jackson scored 27 points and grabbed six rebounds in his NBA debut against the San Antonio He notched a rookie Spurs. season-high 14 assists, adding 14 points and five rebounds against the Boston Celtics. Jackson finished fourth in NBA Sixth Man Award in 2000-2001 and second in 2001-2002. He grabbed a 500th career rebound in 2000 and handed out his 500th assist in 1999.
