Lewis joins Golf Channel

Former WXII reporter is also a graduate of UNC-Greensboro

GOLF CHANNEL recently announced the addition of Todd Lewis to its on-air team. Lewis will serve as a host and reporter for Golf Central, the network's marquee nightly news program, and will contribute to the network's news reporting team at PGA TOUR and LPGA Tour events, as assigned, beginning in 2008.

An avid golfer with a single-digit handicap, Lewis brings more than 15 years of sports broadcasting and journalism experience to GOLF CHANNEL. Lewis was an eight-year member of the on-air team at CBS affiliate WKMG in Orlando, most recently as sports director. Lewis also worked for Orlando-based Sun Sports cable television network, serving as a reporter for the Florida Gators football pre and post game shows and host for the Summertime Golf Show, a weekly 30-minute golf travel show.

A graduate of the University of North Carolina Greensboro, Lewis' broadcasting career began in 1991 in Winston-Salem, N.C. as a sports reporter for independent WXII. He then joined NBC affiliate WECT in Wilmington, N.C., as a sports anchor and reporter, producing and anchoring the weekend sportscasts, where he received Associated Press Best Sports Feature award in 1995. His next career move took him to Spokane, Wash., at ABC affiliate KXLY as weekend sports anchor. Lewis returned to his home state of North Carolina in 1998 as weekend sports anchor for CBS affiliate WRAL in Raleigh, before moving to Orlando and WKMG in 1999.

WSSU was led by Brian Fisher's 13 points in the loss. Jamal Durham and Isiah Tucker were also impressive for the Rams with nine and eight points respectively.

Beasley led the 'Cats with 40 points on 14-of-22 shooting from the field including a three for four evening from behind the three-point arc. He added 15 rebounds and an assist to his total in 23 minutes of play. The loss drops the Rams to 4-6 overall with the Wildcats improve to 8-3 overall with the victory.

Charlotte Bobcats' second half tix on sale

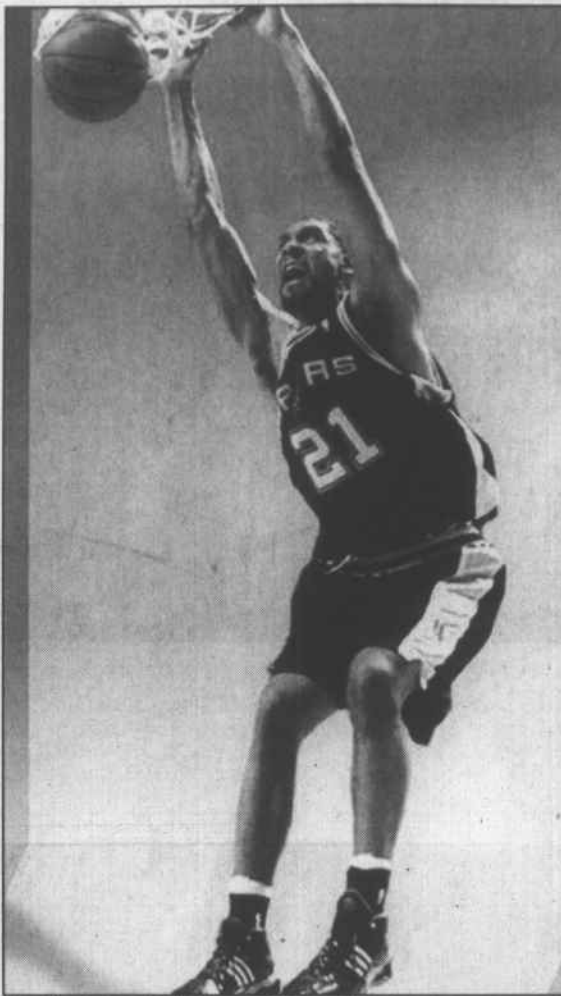
Team will take on a number of top-notch opponents

Last week, the Charlotte Bobcats put single-game tickets for the second half of the 2007-08 season on sale at ticketmaster.com, (704) BOBCATS, (704) 522-6500, or the box office at Charlotte Bobcats Arena. Individual tickets start at just \$15, with more than 5,000 seats each night priced at \$35 or less.

January's 10-game home schedule is highlighted by marquee matchups with Allen Iverson, Carmelo Anthony and the Denver Nuggets on Monday, Jan. 14, and Tony Parker, Tim Duncan and the defending champion San Antonio Spurs one week later on Monday, Jan. 21. February's home schedule includes a visit by Kobe Bryant and the LA Lakers on Monday, Feb. 11. March features a Southeast Division showdown with Dwayne Wade, Shaquille O'Neal and the Miami Heat on Saturday, March 22. April's playoff push hits high gear as the Bobcats host LeBron James and last year's Eastern Conference champion Cleveland Cavaliers on Wednesday, April 2, followed by a return visit from Kevin Garnett, Ray Allen, Paul Pierce and the title contending Boston Celtics on Saturday, April 9.

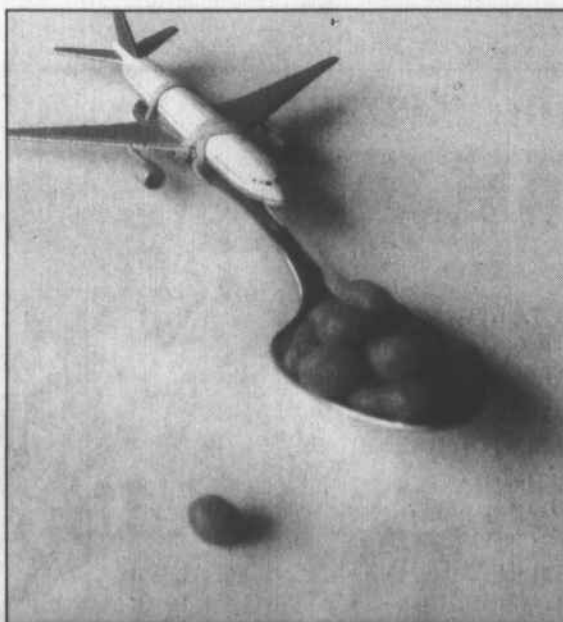
A&M (7-3) finishes at number nine, and Virginia Union (9-3) rounds out the poll at number 10.
