International Children's Choir performs locally to full house

It was standing-room only at Galilee Missionary Baptist Church on Sunday as the Children of the World International Children's Choir performed.

The choir is made up of orphaned or disadvantaged children from' countries around the world who are receiving aid from World Help, a nondenominational Christian organization that ministers in 60 countries.
