The Stratford Rotary Club of Winston-Salem recently awarded \$2,500 college scholarships to three 2009 local high school graduates. They are:

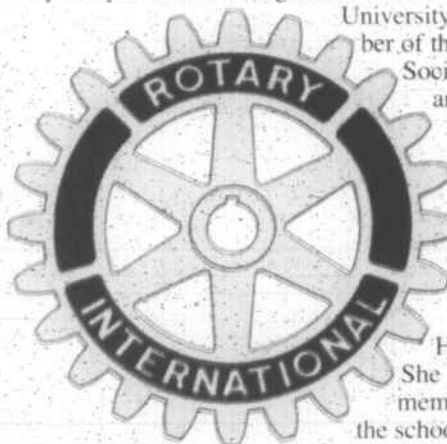
