Background Reading: Ezekiel

Lesson Scripture: John 10:7-

Lesson Aims: To understand the significance of the shepherd; to recognize that Jesus wants to save all of us; to appreciate His faithfulness; and to lead other lost sheep to Him.

Background: As the spring quarter closes, we focus on the great I am's of Jesus found in John 6:35,48, 51; 8:12 and 9:5; 10:7, 9; 10:11,14; 11:25; 14:6; and 15:1,5. All are quite fascinating and thought provoking.

Our lesson today centers on the shepherd that cares for the sheep. To fully appreciate the shepherd's care, we must take a quick look at the sheep.

I heard a sermon once that described them as dumb for the most part. They pay no attention to where they are going; they get stuck in ravines; find themselves on steep ridges; and they don't fight the flies away! Sheep get

Marvin Sapp's new CD and DVD, "I Win," are chart-toppers.

Released last month, the CD debuted at #1 on the Gospel sales chart, and #9 on the Billboard Top 200. Additionally, the live recording DVD debuted at #2 on the Christian Music Video chart. The first single, "My Testimony," is a smash on gospel radio.

"It is a transparent, introspective look at what I came through and how, in the midst of it all, I still maintained and am maintaining my faith," Sapp says of the single, which he co-wrote with Aaron Lindsey. "The song is about me sharing how I got through it, not just that I got through it."

Recorded live at Evangel Cathedral just outside of Washington, D.C., "I Win" is

Sapp's first CD since the passing of his wife and manager MaLinda, and it is the first live CD recorded outside of Sapp's Grand Rapids, Mich. hometown. Still, the discs are indeed a musical triumph, with 10 brilliant tracks that reinforce Sapp's sentiment that "because I endured, I won."

Marvin Sapp first hit the national stage in 1990 as a member of the groundbreaking group Commissioned. The group disbanded around 1996 and Sapp launched his solo career. After a string of Top-Ten radio hits and a considerable following in Gospel music, Sapp saw unprecedented mainstream success in 2007 when a song that started out as a spontaneous moment of worship became a runaway hit at radio.

The song "Never Would Have Made It" went on to become the #1 most played song of any genre at radio, and was the first Gospel song to sell one million ringtones. The rest, as they say, is history.

Grace will celebrate the legacy of its charter members, including J. S. Lanier, who was one of the city's first African American lawyers. Other notable members included Dr. Raphael O'Hara Lanier, the first African American ambassador of the 20th Century and the first president of Texas Southern University.

Grace will honor its educational legacy during the service by announcing funding for the James S. Hill Scholarship at Winston-Salem State University. Hill, a charter member of Grace, was the chief fundraiser for Slater Industrial School, which is now WSSU, from its founding in

1892 to 1900. A prominent building on the school's campus is named in his honor. Later he worked as field solicitor for Livingstone College and served as president of the Forsyth Savings & Trust, the city's first African American-owned bank and the People's Building & Loan Association, which was the only mortgage provider for African Americans at

Elder Kenneth R. Sullivan Jr., the moderator of the 105th Anniversary / Founder's Day committee, stated, "The J. S. Hill Scholarship project will be the centerpiece of the 105th Anniversary events designed to reengage with the community. The J. S. Hill Scholarship will be an outreach ministry focused on helping deserving students receive a quality education at WSSU."
