Locals compete for Marvtastic Talent Extravaganza crown

The competition was fierce Sunday as local acts competed in the North Carolina Black Repertory Company's first ever Talent Marvtastic Extravaganza.

The Black Rep has been searching for the area's most talented residents for the past several weeks. Open auditions were first held. Thirty acts were picked to compete in several sub-categories, such as Hip Hop/Spoken Word. Gospel R&B/Jazz/Pop. Nine finalists were selected by a panel of judges to compete in Sunday's Best of the Best finale at The Arts Council Theatre.

Sylvia Sprinkle-Hamlin, NCBRC production director and widow of NCBRC founder Larry Leon Hamlin, said the talent contest drew impressive performers ranging in age from eight to 80.

'Winston-Salem has a lot of excellent artists within the community. This gives them an opportunity to shine and show people what they can do," she said. WQMG deejay Renee

Vaughn and comedian Debra Terry emceed the finale, which was judged by a panel included famed Saxophonist Joe Robinson and longtime Black Rep Musical Director Tony Gillion.

Nicholas Brown was one of the youngest contestants. Although he is just 11, he was already a veteran performer before he performed Whitney Houston's "I Look to You" on Sunday night. Nicholas started singing in the choir at his church, Mt. Olive Baptist Church. He's performed at other Black Rep events and has sung the national anthem at Winston-Salem Dash and Winston-Salem State University basketball games.

"It feels great," Brown said about making the finals. "It feels like I'm moving towards the top.

Contestant Jonathan Cox, 28, said music runs in his family. His mother is a music professor at the University of Dayton in Ohio, and the rest of his family are singers. Cox, assistant director for multicultural affairs at Wake Forest University, has performed at open mic events. but the Marvtastic Talent Extravaganza was his very first talent competition. He performed "Rearview," a song he penned himself, while playing his guitar.

"I just love it. I've always loved music," said Cox. "I've always considered it the background to my life.
