Anchor Cameron Kent and Greg "Catman" Good, the Carolina Panthers' Super Fan.

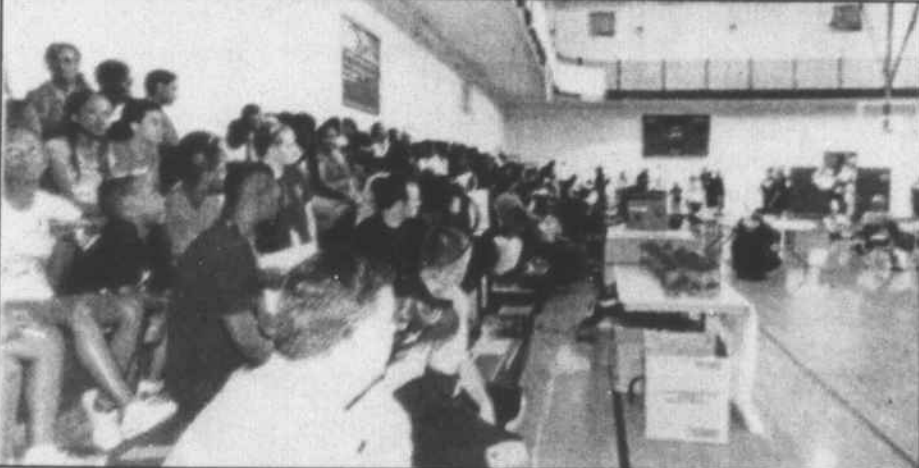
Isiah Huffin won the Slam Dunk Contest. The other top finishers were: Reggie Grey, Andra King and Garren Loyd.
