WILSON DESIRES A PLATFORM PROGRESSIVE ENOUGH TO GET THE VOTE OF THE BULL MOOSE

PRESIDENT WANTS MARSHALL AGAIN AS RUNNING MATE

Secretary Baker Arrives With "President's Own" Draft of Platform; Harmony Program Firmly Established.

CAMPAIGN WILL BE AGGRESSIVE Country Will be Covered By Leading Orators; Baker Will Campaign; Convention Begins at Noon Today.

Wilson Wants Marshall A Presidential boom, around which most of the pre-convention fights have centered, willed away tonight under the influence of a message from the White House that the President desired Marshall again as his running mate.

Secretary Baker also effectively disposed of efforts in his behalf for that office. "The President is for the nomination of Vice-President Marshall," was the emphatic statement tonight of Secretary Baker.

The "President's own" draft of the platform is said to have been typewritten by himself and will be delivered by Mr. Baker to Senator Stone of Missouri, chairman of the resolutions committee.

As to woman suffrage, it was understood the platform probably will suggest that the women continue their efforts for the ballot in the respective States.

The principal planks it was authorized to state, will deal with the Administration's trials and achievements in handling international and Mexican affairs, its rapid and deliberate steps toward "preparedness for peace" and the record of economic and industrial legislation contributing to general prosperity.

Address Delivered by President Wilson to the West Point Cadets

West Point, N. Y., June 13.—Addressing the graduating class of the military academy here today, President Wilson touched on almost all the subjects discussed by former Justice Hughes, in his telegram accepting the Republican nomination, and alluded to Americanism, militarism, preparedness, peace, war and other topics of pressing interest.

Continuing, he said: "You know that the chief thing that is holding many people back from enthusiasm for what is called preparedness is the fear of militarism. I want to say a word to you young gentlemen about militarism. You're not a militarist, because you are military. Militarism does not consist in the existence of an army, not even in the maintenance of a very great army. Militarism is a spirit. It is a point of view. It is a purpose. The purpose of militarism is to prepare armies for aggression. The spirit of militarism is the opposite of the civilian spirit—the citizen spirit. In a country where militarism prevails, the military man looks upon the civilian, regards him as inferior, thinks of him as intended for his, the military man's support and use and just so long as America is a country that spirit and point of view is impossible with us. There is as yet in this country so far as I can discover, no taint of the spirit of militarism."

"The idea I want to leave with you boys today is this: No matter what comes always remember that first of all you are citizens of the United States before you are officers, and that you are officers because you are present in your particular profession what the citizenship of the United States stands for. There is no danger of militarism if you are genuine Americans and I, for one, do not doubt that you are. When you begin to have the militaristic spirit—the militarist spirit, that is all right—then begin to doubt whether you are American or not."

SHARP REJOINER IS BEING PREPARED TO CARRANZA NOTE

Will Probably Not be Sent Until After the St. Louis Convention Unless Situation Demands Immediate Action.

Washington, June 13.—Unless the increasing seriousness in Mexico forces the dispatch of the reply to General Carranza's demand for withdrawal of the American army, probably will be delayed until after the St. Louis convention, probably because the Administration wishes to avoid any drastic step at a time when it might appear to be prompted by political influences.

Secretary Lansing and his advisers are said to have given careful consideration to the possibility that the Administration might be charged with playing politics in dealing with the problem. The rapid spread of anti-American propaganda in Northern Mexico, however, coupled with existing grave economic conditions, may take the situation out of their hands.
