Ery's Homer In Ninth With Two On Beats Twins

FAST AND EXCITING GAME GOES TO HORNETS IN NINTH

HAMILTON WEAKENS IN NINTH INNING AND HORNETS WIN

Re-hashed Hornets Stage Uphill Fight, Winning Out in Last Inning; The Twins Make Desperate Effort in Ninth.

His Official Highness, President W. G. Branham, of the North Carolina League of Professional Base Ball Clubs, lent his official dignity to the game yesterday afternoon and after introducing himself to the slaves in the press box, for which we are duly thankful, the game which later events proved to be by far the most exciting game of the season, started. To tell the score in the first part of the story is customary and we do not wish to depart from the custom so will inform the few who do not know what it is, that the score was 2 to 4 in favor of Ery—big Paschal—Charlotte.

That was a whole of a ball game from start to finish. By far the fastest in time and one which was one thing after another to keep the fans on edge all during the game. A lightning doubleplay by the locals in the first inning which prevented a Charlotte runner from scoring, started the things of good. Following this in rapid succession were nice catches and other things which go to making a game interesting.

The one play which gummed the works so far as the locals was concerned was a home run over the left field fence with two Charlotte runners on the paths, by Ery. That lone got one in his groove and crowned it for the circuit.

The Charlotte club overcame a two run lead and fought one of the greatest up-hill fights seen here in a long time. For eight innings Hamilton, the new Twin pitcher, held the score six hits and one run. In the ninth inning the first batsman up was an easy out, Paschal started the fireworks with a double to the left field fence, Wofford duplicated, scoring Paschal. High fouled out to Hiller. Geary, batting for Doeppe, pronounced "do" for hit to right for a base. With runners on first and second base the nut pitcher, after chasing the squirrels off, lit onto the ball and it was good night ball game. Singleton followed with an infield hit, the fifth of the inning, and Smith was tossed out at first by McMahon.

Twins Make Bid The Twins made a desperate effort to overcome the two-run lead but fell one run shy of tying the count. McMahon started things off with a single to right field. Bumb forced him at second. Fry delivered a one bagger to right center, sending Bumb to third. Glaxner was sent in to hit for Hamilton and flew to Geary, playing right field, Bumb scoring. Hiller drew a base on balls, the only one of the game, and Rollings humpbacked one to High for the first out.

Charlotte lineup shifted The Charlotte club looked like a regular ball team for the first time during the series. Nicholson, the plucky little Charlotte second baseman, played his usual position until ninth inning, when he was sent in to catch. His left thumb is in splinters as a result of a broken bone. Doeppe, apparently an old timer, was behind the bat for the visitors. He caught a nice game but was taken out in the first of the ninth inning to let Geary hit for him. The last of the ninth inning saw Nicholson catching Singleton playing second base and Geary right field.
