Y. M. C. A. CAMPERS TO LEAVE FOR HIGH ROCK NEXT WEEK

About a score of boys will go into camp next Tuesday under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian Association at High Rock, on the Yadkin river. The Y. M. C. A. camp is an annual affair and many boys of this city count it a rare privilege to be numbered among the members of the camp from season to season. Although under the association auspices, the camp is not limited to members of the association, any boy in the city who cares to go camping is welcome to join the crowd. The rates are very reasonable for camps of this character, being only \$10.50 for two weeks. Boys may go for a shorter period at the same rate.

These Y. M. C. A. camps are held each summer all over the country. Practically every city association conducts a camp of this character, and this season approximately 25,000 boys will camp under Y. M. C. A. auspices. Expert leaders are in charge and the moral tone of these camps is of a high order. Character building is the main objective, and this is reached through the daily Bible classes, educational lectures, nature study, First Aid talks and the camp fire features, which are of a vocational in character.

ARREST ROCKY MOUNT PORTER

Believed to be Thief Who Has Been Rifling Mail Pouches; Many Articles Stolen.

(Special To The Journal)
Rocky Mount, N. C., June 14.—With the arrest of Harry Perry, a colored station porter and mail transfer employee, officers, both of the city and civil service departments, believe that they have found a solution to the mysterious rifling of the mails which has been going on for more than a year and articles ranging in value from a \$200 and a dollar watch to diamond rings have been missed. The news was taken in charge here today while at his duties about the station by Deputy Marshall B. Sturdivant of Raleigh, and his arrest followed the finding at his home of ten empty mail sacks and pouches, though there has failed all efforts to find any of the missed articles, or where he might have disposed of them in the instance of his guilt of theft in anything other than the pouches.

The case was worked up by officers Sturdivant and Taylor of the local police force who stumbled on this Federal violation in seeking to connect the negro with receiving whiskey shipments. The case was reported to the Federal authorities some weeks ago but they have been delaying action for some reason until this date. The defendant was taken before United States Commissioner Bowen in Wilson this afternoon. The defendant explains the presence of the bags at his home here by declaring that he used them to carry his home from his work, on account of the fact that the delivery did not reach him until late in the day. He has been in the employ of the railroad at this point and employed as a baggage or passenger train for upwards of fifteen years and is well known and enjoys the general esteem of both white and colored. He has employed Messrs. Thorne and Capelle as counsel.
