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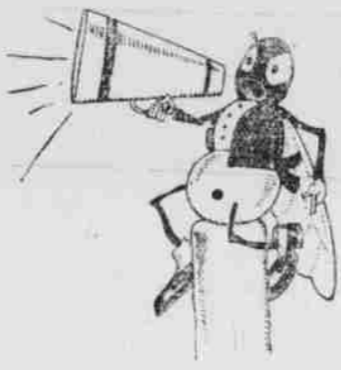

MIDDLE FORK AND VIENNA REPORTS

Vital Statistical Record Shows Nearly Fifty Per Cent More Births Than Deaths Last Year

Annual reports of vital statistics for Vienna and Middle Fork townships were received by Registrar of Deaths Leitch yesterday.

Mr. C. F. Mickle, registrar for Vienna township, reports a total of 32 births, 12 white males and 20 white females; four colored males and four colored females. Only one illegitimate birth was reported in the township.

Mr. Mickle also reports 17 deaths, eight white males and six white females; three colored females and no colored males.

The report for Vienna township shows a gain of 15 births of the deaths.

The report for Middle Fork township, recorded by Mr. C. W. Jones, registrar, shows a total of 77 births, 38 white males and 39 white females; three colored males and four colored females. Not a single illegitimate birth was reported in this township.

The Middle Fork report shows a total of 41 deaths, 14 white males and 27 white females; two colored males and five colored females.

The report for the township shows 58 more births than deaths for the year.

RED CROSS RECEIVES \$1,500 IN GOLF TOURNAMENT MEDALS
