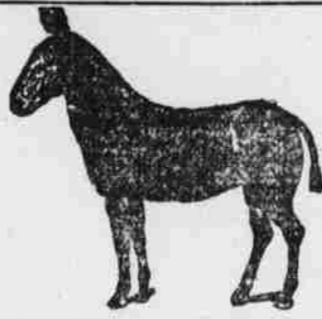

## IMPORTANT WORK OF Y. M. C. A. CAMP

Dr. A. M. Trawick Delivered Forceful Address at the Paramount Sunday on "Christianity in War Times."

Dr. A. M. Trawick of Nashville, Tenn., delivered a forceful address at the Paramount Theater Sunday afternoon at the mass meeting held under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. His theme was "Christianity in War Times."

Dr. Trawick emphasized the fact that a national test is being made at this time and that we must prepare for the return of soldiers now serving abroad; that the country will come out of the present conflict either better or worse for the experience.

The spirit of co-operation that the manhood of this country is learning ought to be of lasting good to the future of the land. In the camps the sons of the laborer, the college professor, the banker, the merchant and financier are all struggling side by side to attain one goal. He strikingly contrasted the lack of co-operation in the churches where denominational lines have been building and lack of personal Christianity is obvious.

He referred to the national fault of centering all upon money making and said this is not characteristic with the boys at camp. They are going to demand Christian prosperity in addition to economical prosperity when they return he said.

Dr. Trawick spoke about the splendid work being accomplished by the Y. M. C. A. at the camps and in France, and said the three great evils of camp life, gambling, profanity and sexual vice were steadily being overcome by the influence the camps are having over them.

In the afternoon Dr. Trawick delivered another interesting address at the Centenary Methodist church on the work of the Y. M. C. A. at the camps.

## HEATLESS DAY IS OBSERVED IN CITY

First Heatless Monday has Passed off Quietly in Winston-Salem; Big Crowds at the Theaters

Winston-Salem passed through its first "heatless" day yesterday without a hitch. As far as known, there was little inconvenience to the people as they had all had ample notice to prepare for the holiday, the first of the "heatless" days under the order of Fuel Administrator Garrison. The great markets and grocery stores closed at the noon hour. All the public stores in the city with the exception of the drug stores were closed. The effect of the order was noticed principally in the large crowds at various public places. There would probably have been larger crowds on the street but for the chilly weather. The number of people on the streets was about normal.

Business in the drug stores, post office and other public places here generally was normal. The attendance at the Twin-City Club was slightly increased by the closing of the theaters and the mercantile establishments in the city.

The order of the Government was received at the office of the city manager by the city clerk, H. H. Dunn, at 10 o'clock yesterday. The order was a call for the day to be observed as a day of rest for all of the city's employees.

Hundreds of people took advantage of the holiday by attending the theaters. The attendance at all of the theaters was unusually large and some

## RE-ARRANGEMENT OF THE REVENUE DISTRICTS MADE

Director Watts Adds Two Districts Because of Additional Work in War Tax Collections

MAKE PAYMENTS WITH TAX RETURNS

Statesville Merchants to Observe Mondays; Increase Treadle Park Production and Curtail Delivery of Goods

Statesville, Jan. 21.—Owing to the increased amount of work to be done and the large amount of war taxes to be collected throughout the Fifth District of North Carolina during the coming year, Collector A. B. Watts has found it necessary to re-divide his district, increasing the divisions from eight to ten. The change has caused the appointment of two new division deputies in the person of H. B. Carter of Asheville and John P. Hampton of Lansing.

## MINISTERS ASKED TO AID IN INCOME TAX COLLECTION

(By The Associated Press.) Washington, Jan. 21.—Clergymen of every denomination have been asked to assist in the collection of the income tax. Letters have been sent by the Treasury to 124,000 ministers asking them to impress upon their congregations that it is their duty to pay the taxes willingly and cheerfully. "The clergy throughout Germany," said Daniel C. Roper, Commissioner of Internal Revenue, "are exhorting the people to bend all their energies and to endure extreme sacrifices to win the war, that the cause of autocracy and military world domination may triumph. Shall not the clergy of free America sound a ringing call to the people to help the noble cause of democracy and freedom?" Hundreds of letters have been received from clergymen promising cooperation.
