MINISTERS ASKED TO AID IN NCOME TAX COLLECTION

(By The Associated Press.) Washington, Jan. 21.-Clergymen of every denomination have been asked to assist in the collection of the income tax.

Letters have been sent by the Treasury to 124,000 ministers asking them to impress upon their congregations that it is their duty to pay the taxes willingly and cheerfully.

"The clergy throughout Germany," said Daniel C. Roper, Commissioner of Internal Revenues, "are exhorting and to encure extreme sacrifices to win the war, that the cause of autocracy and military world domination may triumph. Shall not the clargy of free America sound a ringing call to the people to help the noble cause of democracy and freedom?
